

JOB HARRIMAN LINKED IN BRIBE

**DETECTIVE FRANKLIN
MENTIONS HARRI-
MAN'S NAME**

**"DARROW GOT MONEY THROUGH
HARRIMAN," AVERS FRANKLIN**

**Darrow Trial Continue Today With
Direct Testimony From the Detec-
tive That He Got Bribery Money
From Darrow to Specifically Buy
Jurors for the McNamara Brothers'
Acquittal.**

Los Angeles, May 31.—Detective B. H. Franklin, the confessed briber of the McNamara jurors, continued with his story today in which he attempted to connect the former McNamara chief of counsel, Clarence Darrow, with the alleged bribery of Tammam Lockwood when the Darrow trial opened. Franklin was questioned by Assistant District Attorney Ford. The trial has been at a standstill since Wednesday.

Sworn testimony that Clarence Darrow, the former chief counsel for the McNamara brothers, gave him \$4,000 for the specific purpose of bribing Geo. N. Lockwood, a juror in the McNamara trial today.

Franklin connected the name of Job Harriman, associate counsel for the McNamaras, by stating that the money was obtained by Darrow through Harriman. The money used for the purpose was kept in a safety deposit vault.

Scores Franklin.

Attorney Rogers for the defense, said the testimony of Franklin was like a recitation in the old red school house. He said it was plan to everybody in the court room that Franklin was reciting a piece, and said he used words unnatural to him. He said it sounded like he had read over and learned something the district attorney had written out for him.

District Attorney Fredericks rose and objected angrily to the intimation of Rogers. Rogers then said: "I don't accuse Captain Fredericks because he was out of the state when it was done."

DIXON DENOUNCES NEW.

**Calls Yesterday's Ticket Incident an
Open Insult.**

Washington, May 31.—Bitter denunciations of Harry S. New of Indianapolis, chairman of the national republican committee for what he termed a "gratuitous insult to the only living former president in the United States in denying Roosevelt's request for 250 tickets to the Chicago convention" was made here today by Senator Dixon of Montana, commander-in-chief of the Roosevelt forces. "This last performance on the part of Taft's personal representative," said Dixon, "is on a par with the cheap and ignominious policy that has permeated Taft's campaign throughout."

WITNESSES PRAISE ARCHBALD

**Lackawanna Officials Claim Judge Is
Not in Wrong.**

Washington, May 31.—That Judge Archbald of the commerce court, had no illicit dealings with the Lackawanna railroad in negotiation for the purchase of the culm piles was testified to today before the house judiciary committee which is investigating the charges against Archbald. Both of the officials absolved Archbald of improper overtures in connection with the Culm negotiations.

CUSUMANO ON EVE OF DEATH

**SOUND OF HAMMER IN DEATH
CELL UNRESTS.**

NO HOPE IS HELD OUT

**Murderess at Boston and Her Affinity
to Die Next Week.**

Boston, May 31.—For the first time since her conviction, with her affinity Harry Marshall, of the murder of her husband, Mrs. Lena Cusumano today showed signs of breaking down. Evidence of her weakness came when she heard carpenters hammering in the death cell.

The executive council is to meet Wednesday to consider Cusumano's case but it is unlikely they will take favorable action. The council already has refused to interfere in Marshall's case and both are under sentence to die next week.

CODLING MOTH DISCUSSED.

**Its Treatment Explained by Experi-
ment Station Expert.**

The codling moth must be looked upon as an important factor in the fruit industry wherever apples are grown. Pears are sometimes also attacked by this insect but not with as universal seriousness as are the apples. Some new fruit sections make the boast that they are immune from the ravages of the codling moth due to some mysterious conditions of environment but it is only a matter of time until they too will have to adopt measures for its control. We do not wish to convey the impression that this pest will be equally as destructive in all localities but that there has never yet been found an apple section completely immune from the codling moth which remained in that condition for any length of time.

Important to Know All Stages.

In order for the apple grower to control this insect in the most economical manner he should know all of the stages through which it passes in its life cycle. Unfortunately, however, he is generally only acquainted with the larval or worm stage.

The codling moth passes through four distinct stages during each life cycle, and they are as follows: egg, larva, pupa and moth stage.

The egg is a pearly white shining, disc like object having much the same appearance as a minute trout scale and they are laid singly upon the leaves and the fruit. They are about 1-20th of an inch in diameter and can only be seen when held at a certain angle with the light which makes it difficult to find them. A few days before hatch a minute black spot may be seen in the center of the egg which is the head of the worm or larva. The length of the egg stage varies from three to 21 days with an average of about ten.

The larva when first hatched is scarcely 1-16th of an inch long. The body is slender and translucent while the head is black and shiny. It is rarely seen when so small as it enters the fruit soon after hatching. As the larva develops it moults five times, the color of the head changing from black to a dark brown and the body from pink to white. The adult larva is about 3-4ths of an inch long and 1-12th of an inch in thickness. This stage varies from 16 to 24 days which time is spent in the fruit but it is also possible for it to live upon the leaves in case there is no fruit.

Upon leaving the fruit the larva generally seeks a protected place usually under the scales of the tree and there spins a cocoon. While in this cocoon a most wonderful change occurs and when it finally forces its way out and bursts the shining dark skin which covers it, a fully developed moth is the result. It is in this stage that it spends its winter. The length of the pupal stage in the winter varies from 10 to 15 months.

ROOSEVELT WILL LEAD THE FIGHT IN CHICAGO

**While Not Confirming, Report Does Not
Deny Such Action Likely, No Com-
promise in Ohio Tolerated**

New York, May 31.—That Colonel Roosevelt will go to Chicago to personally lead the fight for his nomination by the republican national convention is the belief here of well informed politicians. The former president would not deny that such a course was unlikely.

No Compromise Allowed.

Voicing a set determination to make no compromise whatever with any opponent for the republican nomination, Roosevelt today telegraphed Walter Brown, his Ohio manager, instructing him to entertain no proposition from the Taft camp in regard to a compromise in Ohio on the question of delegates.

Roosevelt's telegram to Brown said: "I have just seen the telegram which President Taft sent to Arthur I. Voreys, declaring he would not tolerate any compromise in Ohio. Until I saw the telegram I had never seen any suggestion there was to be a compromise. I presume such a suggestion came from the Taft forces. In the first place I would not consent to any compromise and in the next place we carried Ohio by more than 30,000 in the popular primary. Any attempt to give Taft a single delegate at large would mean a sanction of a deliberate effort to defraud the people by trick-

ery, and nullify their expressed will. Taft has, in morals and in equity, no claim to a single Ohio delegate. I wish this issue clearly made. We stand for the rights of the people to choose their own candidates and to have delegates carry out their choice."

Roosevelt denied his present intention was to appear personally on the floor of the convention but when pressed, admitted he might change his mind, and make the trip. Medill McCormick, and Chancey Depew, both of Illinois, and both close to Roosevelt, conferred with him today at the Outlook office. While no positive verification was obtainable neither would deny the question that Roosevelt was personally leading progressive forces in the nomination fight was gone into. McCormick emphatically denied the report that he was compelled to arrange for a pilgrimage of the Illinois delegates to Oyster Bay for a consultation with Roosevelt to prevent their deserting Roosevelt's forces. McCormick said, "The delegates wished to go to Oyster Bay. They are for Colonel Roosevelt first, last and all the time. Many could not afford to make trip, so at my own expense, I invited them to come as my guests. They will meet Roosevelt at Oyster Bay tomorrow."

ELOPERS ENTER WALLOWA BY WAY OF MINAM BRIDGE TUESDAY

Slipping away and eluding their pursuers by forced hiking methods, pretty Miss Norris and T. Hopson, 17 and 22 years of age, who make up the Elgin eloping party, have made their way into Wallowa county. This is the word received from Deputy Sheriff Lee Warnick who reported to headquarters today that the couple is known to have crossed the Wallowa bridge. They have taken to the hills again but their arrest is believed to be a nearby possibility.

Little is known of the physical condition of the young girl, who, dressed as a male mountaineer has played hide and seek with the law's officers nearly all week. Just how the officers have verified the report that the elopers have reached Wallowa county is not made known here but Warnick was positive in his statement. It is also said that the trail leads have better clues now and hope to run the

youths down in short order, although it is also a possibility that the lovers can find sustenance for their appetites by halting at ranch and mountaineer cabins and for many days yet to come, elude very effectively the posse of officers that has been on a hunt for them since their elopement from Elgin early in the week. Miss Norris is making herself the most noted girl in Oregon by her brilliant and long-lived flight and the romance has now reached a stage where it has become of state wide interest.

Entered Wallowa Tuesday.

The belief is expressed that the officers combed the Blue Mountains in Union county while the elopers were in Wallowa county for the sheriff's office has been apprised that it was some time Tuesday when the girl and her protector passed the gateway bridge.

WRIGHT'S LIFE IS CONTENTION

**PARIS PAPERS DISAGREE AS TO
LATE AVIATOR.**

PRAISE IS SCATTERING

**Called Imitator and Stealer of Other
Men's Ideas by One Paper.**

Paris, May 31.—Newspaper here today publish many comments on the death of Wilbur Wright, including much controversial matter relative to the dead aviator's claim as a father of flying.

The Le Matin calls Wright a "common mechanic," who appropriated other men's ideas without giving them credit attempting to "hog the discovery of aviation for the purpose of riches." The Gauliers defends Wright saying, "However proud we may be to count Frenchmen among the first selves to the contempt of future generations by refusing to admit that Wright taught them all."

MOATS JURY IS WEALTHY.

**Summerville Woman Wins Verdict in
Federal Court at Pendleton.**

Aggregate wealth of considerably more than a million dollars was represented in the federal jury that returned a verdict in favor of Mrs. Ida M. Moats of Summerville at Pendleton before Federal Judge R. S. Bean this week. The verdict rendered in favor of Mrs. Moats is in the sum of two \$5,000 life insurance policies taken out just prior to the death of Mr. Moats at Summerville and the New York concern disputed the obligation. The case went to the federal court without trial in district court and Mrs. Moats won the verdict. C. E. Cochran was her attorney.

The jury empaneled for the case were all wealthy men and considerably more than a million was represented on the jury list.

W. J. HUGHES BUYS FARM.

**Choice Dairy and Stock Ranch in Ladd

It is an ideal dairy and stock ranch, there are about 100 acres under cultivation including some fine meadow land. Mr. Conaway has the place rented and he will probably harvest the present crop.

Warren Company Gets Contracts.

To the surprise of many the Home Paving company withdrew its bids at the council session this morning on First Street, Main and Washington avenues Mr. Bramwell and Mr. Roesch of the Home company appeared in person stating that they had found sentiment against delay in the work and therefore withdrew their bids, but asked to be considered on future work. The council immediately let the paving contracts for the three streets to the Warren Construction company, ordinances which empower the expenditure of the sums of money necessary being posted on bill boards where every taxpayer who is interested in this work or who will have to pay a portion of the cost may go and read what the ordinances contain. The matter of placing the city engineer on a flat salary was discussed and referred to a committee by the mayor.

GOVEZ PLAYING KEEN POLITICS

**INTERVENTION NOT A
NECESSITY SAYS
HOUSE LEADER**

**"SPECTACULAR SURRENDER" OF
NEGROES IS PROBABLE PLAN**

**Be Securing a Surrender of the Ne-
gro Revolutionists in Cuba Gomm
Aims to Bring Popular Favor to
Himself Thereby Insuring His Re-
election Is Report of Deep Political
Plot.**

Havana, May 31.—Dilatory tactics on the part of government troops in attacking the negro revolutionists today lent color to the belief that President Gomez has deliberately fostered the rebellion to enhance his own political standing.

Politicians here momentarily expect to hear of a spectacular surrender of the rebels which they believe will be followed by an outburst of governmental enthusiasm, which is expected to create a demand for the re-election of President Gomez.

Hay said: "Should destruction of life and property by the insurgents become general, Gomez would be powerless to cope with the situation, and there would be a strong possibility that United States troops might be landed to restore order but I don't expect any such contingency."

No Intervention Necessary.

Washington, May 31.—Strong opposition to intervention in Cuba and the declaration that they believe no such action by the United States will be necessary, was voiced here today by Chairman Hay, of the house military committee, and Chairman William Sulzer of the house committee on foreign affairs.

MONA LISA RECOVERED.

Paris, May 31.—In an extra edition today the La Presse positively announced that detectives have recovered the famous Leonardo Da Vinci painting, Mona Lisa, which was recently stolen from the Louvre. The La Presse does not say where the painting was found or where it is now located.

NEW CLYDE ARRIVES.

Funeral of Wright Impressive.

Dayton, O., May 31.—All industries in Dayton will be suspended tomorrow afternoon during the funeral of Wilbur Wright, the noted aviator, according to a proclamation issued today by the mayor. The details for the funeral are not completed.

Federal Officers Interested.

San Diego, May 31.—Federal secret service men, it was learned today, are here gathering evidence concerning the recent activities of the I. W. W. Following the announcement in Los Angeles that the I. W. W. had given up the fight, the condition are again normal. The vigilantes have ceased their operations entirely.

Atlantic City, N. J., May 31.—In connection with the annual convention of the American Medical association a notable conference is to be held here the coming week for the discussion of health problems in modern industry and the best methods for stamping out industrial diseases.
