COBBLING MOTH DISCUSSED.

ter is from some time in the fall until the following spring. As there are two complete life cycles annually in Oregon we must also have a pupal stage in the summer and this generally lasts from 12 to 45 days depending upon locality.

The body of the moth is of a modest greenish-brown color and about 3-8 of an inch long. When fully expanded the distance from the tip of one wing to the tip of the other is about 3-4 of an inch. The characteristic marking which distinguishes them from so many other moths is a large golden spot on the outer posterior angle of each wing. The males may be further distinguished by a

pencil of black hair on the hind wings and a black spot on the upper surface of each wing. The length of the life of the moth varies from three to ten days depending upon the weather conditions.

Important Facts.
In controlling the cobbler moth the most important date for the orchardist to know is the time when the eggs hatch and the larvae first enter the fruit. Of course it is well to know the whole life cycle but one must know this date if one is to be successful in controlling it.

Unfortunately for the apple grower the moths do not appear at the same time each spring, some eggs require longer than others to hatch, some larvae remain in the fruit longer than others, thus making it possible for one to find them in all stages in the summer or during the second generation. This makes it difficult for one to know when to spray for the last brood of worms.

As far as known now the following dates are approximately correct for Eastern Oregon: first generation, eggs laid most June 30, most larvae enter fruit July 10; second generation, eggs laid most Aug. 25; larvae enter fruit most about Sept. 5th. The second generation is quite scattered and some of the worms of this generation may enter the fruit before the larvae of the first are all gone.

Control.
One application of spray should be given the trees just after the petals of the flowers fall in order to fill the calyx with poison and another about July 1st to get the first larvae. If a later spraying is to be applied it should be given about the latter part of August and another about two weeks later.

Arsenate of lead, two pounds to 50 gallons of water gives about as good satisfaction as any other spray. It should be applied in the form of a mist which is best obtain with a high pressure and a Vermorel type of nozzle. The foliage and fruit should be coated with this poison so the worms are killed when they eat of the fruit or leaves.

There are several systems used supplementary to spraying such as banding the trees, running pigs or sheep in the orchard to destroy windfalls, etc. The latter is not advisable unless the trees are headed high enough to prevent injury by the animals. According to a record kept of wind falls here last summer about 15 to 20 percent of them contained a worm when they fell.

Spraying must by all means be made the most important method of control but any supplementary systems such as banding and those which do not harm the orchard are certainly worthy of consideration.
