

CONTEST COURT OPENS THURSDAY

SITTING AS COURT THE COMMITTEEMEN TO HEAR CASES

FAIRNESS BELIEVED RULE OF FIFTY-THREE MEMBERS

Final Decision of the Contest Hearing Has No Appeal and Temporary Roll Call Will Be Made up From Decisions of These Men—Attorneys Will Argue Cases Before the Court

Chicago, Ill., June 5.—Practically all of the members of the Republican National Committee are in Chicago in readiness to begin the hearing of delegate's contests tomorrow.

Regular Court to Rule.

In hearing the contests, the National Committee will sit as a court. Attorneys will represent the opposing sides, and they will argue their case and introduce as much testimony as time will permit, both in the form of affidavits and of oral witnesses.

Fifty-Three Are Committee.

The National Committee is composed of fifty-three members, one from each of the forty-eight states, and one each from the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii, the Philippines and Porto Rico.

DARROW CHECK SEEN IN COURT

FRANK MORRISON'S NAMED DRAGGED IN-TO DARROW TRIAL

STATE WOULD TRACE CHECK TO BRIBED JUROR'S HANDS

Darrow and Tvielmoe Endorse Ten Thousand Dollar Check Sent From the East and Cashied in San Francisco Bank—Defense Objects, Claiming All Dealings Not Under Trial.

Los Angeles, June 5.—The prosecution in the Darrow trial offered in evidence today a cancelled check for \$10,000, drawn by Secretary Frank Morrison of the American Federation of Labor in favor of Clarence Darrow.

The defense objected to the introduction of the check in evidence, declaring that for the purposes of the charge under trial it was not necessary to show all of Darrow's dealings with the unions.

Two Attorneys Fined.

Personal and bitter conflicts between Darrow and District Attorney Fredericks marked the session of the court today. Darrow admitted in court of having received checks from Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor as a part of the McNamara defense fund.

HARMON GIVEN ALL OHIO MEN

WILSON'S NINETEEN DELEGATES WRESTED FROM HIM

FINAL VOTE IS WON BY HARMON'S FORCES

Democrats in Ohio Send Solid Delegation to Baltimore Despite Nineteen Are Pledged for Wilson—Roosevelt Anxious About South Dakota. No Bolt at Chicago Thinks Lee

ROOSEVELT CARRIES SOUTH DAKOTA.

St. Louis Falls, S. D., June 5.—Colonel Roosevelt's plurality at the primaries according to the returns from 230 precincts out of 1500 is about 12,000.

Toledo, O., June 5.—After an all-night flight the resolutions committee of the Ohio democratic convention voted, 16 to 6, for a plank binding all Ohio's delegation to the Baltimore convention to vote for Harmon.

The convention adopted the unit rule thus enforcing the 19 delegates captured by Wilson at the recent primaries to vote for Harmon at Baltimore. A majority report of the resolutions committee embodying the unit rule was adopted by a vote of 597 to 357.

"No Bolt" Thinks Lee.

Indianapolis, June 5.—Declaring the Indiana delegates to the national convention will not bolt if he can help it, Chairman Lee of the republican state committee, a Roosevelt supporter, left today for Chicago to appear before the national committee regarding the contested delegates.

Seattle, June 5.—With delegates from Oregon and all parts of Washington in the city the first session of the Northwestern Development congress opened this morning at the Coliseum theatre.

WOMAN SYMPATHIZER KILLED

Police Fight With Mob and Many Die Injured in Scrap.

Newark, N. J., June 5.—Shot down by police reserves called to quell rioting between the wives of the striking railroad laborers, and strikebreakers, Mrs. Feleminé Dauria and a 13-year-old high school boy are dying, and five men are badly injured here today.

The trouble began when the strikers' wives entered the Lackawanna race cut near Branch Brook park, and stoned the strikebreakers. Patrolmen rushed to the scene and charged the women directing the attack, principally at Mrs. Dauria who led the charge on the strikebreakers.

MAKERS PLAN SILK EXHIBIT

FIRST BRITISH EXHIBIT TO BE HELD.

SILK INDUSTRY GROWS

Fancy Makes of British Silk to Be on "Parade" in London.

London, June 5.—The first public exhibition ever held in connection with the silk industries of the United Kingdom was opened today at the Princess Skating Rink.

Few British manufactures prospered more than the making of silk, although the industry does not occupy the important place that it did years ago. Silk was manufactured in England in the reign of James I., who took a great interest in the welfare of the industry, but it was not until 1685, when the revocation of the edict of Nantes sent a stream of prosecuted Huguenots into England, that the trade reached the zenith of its prosperity and importance.

SANTIAGO CALLS FOR ASSISTANCE

FOUR WARSHIP'S ARE RUSHED TO GENE OF DISORDER.

REBELLION PASSING OF GOMEZ'S

Taft and Secretary of State Confer on Action Previous to Issuing Order to Four Warships—Disorders Throughout the Island Are Growing in Intensity and Vigor.

Washington, June 5.—Following a conference between President Taft and Secretary of State Knox it was decided today to rush four battleships from Key West to Santiago, Cuba. Knox said the decision was reached for the purpose of being in better communication with Guantanamo by wireless to have stationed marines in case they are needed.

Santiago Wants Help.

Havana, June 5.—It is reported today that the chamber of commerce at Santiago has asked the United States to intervene in Cuba. Six negroes attempting to escape following wholesale arrests for conspiracy charges at Guana Pinar Del Rio province, were shot and killed today by the federals.

American Troops Landed.

Washington, June 5.—Dispatches say that Captain Kilne of Guanroame station distributed marines to guard American interests near the port, following a demand of the Americans for protection from the Cuban government which they failed to receive.

NEW TRIAL FOR OLSON.

Taft Orders Seattle Socialist to Have New Citizenship Trial.

Washington, June 5.—President Taft and Attorney General Wickersham today ordered the United States officials at Seattle to grant a new trial to Leonard Olson, the socialist whose citizenship was cancelled by Federal Judge Hanford of the western district of Washington.

Archbald Seems Doomed.

Washington, June 5.—Impeachment of Judge Robert Archbald of the commerce court will be recommended, it is privately stated, by members of the house judiciary committee which went into executive session here today to consider Archbald's case following the conclusion of its open investigation of the charges made against him.

Clark Favored in Arkansas

Little Rock, Ark., June 5.—The Democratic State convention of Arkansas assembled here today to name delegates to the national convention. Champ Clark leads in the number of instructed delegates to the State convention and his supporters are hopeful that the delegation to Baltimore will be instructed to vote for him for the presidential nomination.
