### Psi Upsilon Fraternity Meets

New York, June 6.—Many men noted in politics, finance and other walks of life are among the delegates representing the twenty-three chapters of the Psi Upsilon Fraternity at the annual convention of the fraternity which opened here today in Columbia Chapter House for a session of two days. President Taft, a member from the Yale Chapter, who was to be one of the speakers, was unable to attend, owing to a previous engagement at the Annapolis Naval Academy. The list of speakers contain the names of many distinguished men, among them Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia, an alumnus of the Columbia chapter; Ex-Senator John C. Spooner of Wisconsin, who is an alumnus of the chapter of the University of Wisconsin; Herbert L. Bridgeman, the journalist, from the Amherst Chapter, and Isaac F. Russell, chief justice of the Court of Special Sessions, New York University chapter.

### Notes from the Labor World.

New England cotton mill owners employ approximately 100,000 operatives.

The central labor body has organized a provision trades council, at Oakland, California.

The Indiana conference of typographical unions will meet at Muncie, Indiana, July 21.

German industries employ nine million women, of which twenty thousand are employed in mining.

The Greek national assembly has passed a drastic and sensible law regulating the employment of women and children.

An international conference of the association for the prevention of industrial accidents will be held in Zurich, Switzerland, next September.

Under the new scale recently adopted by the Bricklayers' union of San Francisco, if the members work a full week they must work 44 hours and earn in that time \$38.50.

The Cigarmakers' International union, by referendum vote, has decided to hold a general convention at Baltimore, beginning Sept. 10, its first convention in 16 years.

The effort to organize 25,000 Jewish in the East end of London is progressing successfully, and an amalgamation of the English and Jewish tailor for union is already practically completed.

The Hotel and Restaurant Employees International Alliance and Bartenders' International League is authority for the statement that the international union is considering the advisability of erecting a building for its general headquarters.

At its next annual convention which will meet at Detroit on June 10, the Bookbinders' International union is to take up the questions of establishing an old age pension system and of founding a home for sick and disabled members of the union.

The Journeymen Stone Cutters' association reports that during the last year 66 local branches obtained a material increase in wages, the total aggregating close to \$300,000. In addition to this 24 new locals have been added to the association.

Track foremen of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad company demand a change in their ten-hour daily rule, to eight hours on Saturday and time and a half on Sunday, as well as on other days for all overtimes. There are about 600 track

foremen on the system and the average wage is said to be \$16 per week.

The International Brotherhood of Electrical workers is endeavoring to induce the unions of the seceding faction to return to the parent body by offering to receive such unions "without money or without price," and to accord to the membership of all such "Penitent" unions all privileges now enjoyed by the affiliated locals.

The formation of a gigantic federation of employees of the United States government, patterned after the American Federation of Labor and embracing all the various organizations of civil service workers, is proposed in a circular letter which is being sent out by the National League of Government Employees through George L. Cain, the president of the organization.

### New Counterfeiting Is Extensive.

Chicago, June 5.—The federal government has found new kinds of counterfeiting to deal with, counterfeiting on a wholesale scale that eclipses the best efforts of green goods men in their best days. The arrest in Chicago of three men and the seizure in New York of a printing plant where millions of bogus green trading stamps had been made and the confiscation of 1,500,000 bogus stamps has led to the further discovery that a wholesale business in counterfeiting labels for famous brands of things also has been done.

The printing plant discovered at 482 Delancey street in New York City included a wagon load of plates and dies as well as a full equipment of machinery. There also was an enormous quantity of counterfeit stamps and labels on hand and three printers were arrested for complicity in the business for which Samuel Rosenbaum, Bernard Chapman and Nathan Hockman were arrested in Chicago during April, indicted and recently placed under \$5,000 bail awaiting extradition.

After their indictment the three Chicago men went to New York but were so successfully shadowed that the plant where the stamps were printed was located. This materially advanced the case against them. Harold J. Hirst, New York representative of Sperry & Hutchinson company had charge of the investigation and came to Chicago to get the indictment.

"Those arrests and seizures will nip in the bud a country wide plan to defraud merchants and housewives, we think," said Vincent J. Walsh, attorney for the trading stamp company.

The fact that these trading stamps are used in more than 600 cities in the United States gave the counterfeiters a wide field of operation. The cost of making the stamps after the counterfeit dies were made was practically nothing. The counterfeiters are so well done that it requires a powerful magnifying glass to detect them.

### POLITICS AND POLITICIANS

Every republican president since Lincoln, with the exception of Roosevelt, has been a native of Ohio.

Mayor Fitzgerald of Boston is already stumping Massachusetts in his campaign to succeed to the seat of United States Senator Crane.

The lines are being drawn for a sharp political fight in West Virginia for the seat of United States Senator Clarence Watson, whose term will expire next March.

Vermont democrats will meet in Montpelier on June 18 to name a state ticket and select delegates to the democratic national convention at Baltimore.
