ONE LICENCE NOT GRANTED

BROWN & GREENHALGH FAIL TO GET RENEWAL.

Majority Report From Judiciary Committee Is Adopted.

To suddenly cut off the saloon license of Brown & Greenhalgh, to whom a license was transferred when J. F. O'Connell sold his saloon off Depot on Jefferson to Messrs. Brown and Greenhalgh, was the course taken by the judiciary committee last night and later ratified by the council. L. Remillard, formerly in the saloon business here, obtained the eighth license to conduct a saloon and will operate in the location of the old Owl saloon, corner Depot and Jefferson. All other applicants for re-issuance of licenses were successful. The denial of Brown & Greenhalgh came as a surprise to the balance of the council. Committeeman Campbell refused to sign the committee report urging the council to act slowly as there were no specific charges of misconduct against the proprietors of the saloon. Finley and Davis made up a majority, however, and the report went to the council as a whole where it was carried.

This forces the men out of business June 15 and allows Remillard to open on that date, as there can be but eight saloons in the city at one time.

Pendleton, June 6.—(Special)—Defeated again but not without a splendid effort. The game was one of the best seen here this year, both teams fielding well and both pitchers working in good shape. Hewitt for Pendleton had an edge on Enz, the La Grande portsider, in that he kept his hits better scattered.

New Catcher a Star. The features of the game were the hard hitting of Mensor and Scott, the former getting two two-sackers and a triple in three trips to the plate while the latter gathered a three-bagger and two singles out of four times up.

One Error but Costly. The Pippins and Buckaroos both took one in the opening canto by connecting with the sphere at the right time. Pendleton's winning scores came in the fourth by reason of two doubles and an error, the latter the only one credited to the visitors during the game. La Grande started a rally in the ninth but a fast double, Hewitt to Augustus to Lodell broke it up.

101 RANCH BRINGS FIRST CLASS CIRCUS THIS YEAR

GREELEY SPUDS SHORT.

Influence the Market to Advantage of Oregon Potatoes.

Greeley, Colo., June 3.—(Editor La Grande Observer)—It might be of interest to our farmers to know the conditions now existing in and about this greatest farming district in Colorado, because the Greeley potato crop has influenced the markets for years. For about 15 years the average shipments of potatoes alone from this county have been three trainloads a week from September 15th to February 1st. In 1910 the crop was not over 35 per cent of normal and in 1911 it was almost a total failure—not enough spuds raised for seed. The 1910 crop was taken by bugs and grasshoppers and last season, after using carloads of Paris green to kill the pests, the potato vines blighted

and no tubers set on them. This year, 1912, sees a small planting of potatoes and more beets, beans, peas and alfalfa.

The importation of Russians to cultivate the sugar beets seems to be solving the beet raising problem here and all factories in northern Colorado are preparing for big runs. All crops in the Greeley district, except potatoes, promise to be large, in spite of the coldest winter ever experienced in Colorado and a long season of dry windy weather this spring.

The Greeley potato crop in 1912 will influence the market to the advantage of Oregon and Idaho.

The apple prospect on the western slope in Colorado promise well, but the young trees in this section were almost all of them winter killed.
