NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 3rd day of April, 1912, creating improvement district No. 56, and designating Main avenue as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council, on the 25th day of April, 1912, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Main avenue, in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by laying thereon cement sidewalk, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of Main avenue, from the west curb line of First street to the east line of Walnut street.

PHONE CONCERN MEETS AT ELGIN

CONDITION OF FINANCES OF NEW FIRM SHOWN.

Eastern Oregon Telephone Company Stockholders Meet at Elgin.

(Elgin Recorder.)
The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Eastern Oregon Telephone association took place at Blum, enstains opera house in this city on Saturday last, 56 out of 122 shares of stock being represented.

The first business of importance was the election of a board of directors, the following named gentlemen being chosen to conduct the business affairs of the corporation for the ensuing year: J. L. McKinnis, of Summerville; Jonathan Green, W. T. Hug, H. A. Hug and Thomas Fleming of Elgin; W. J. Case of Alsea and E. O. Zeek of Union.

The report of the secretary showed that the cost valuation of the property of the corporation is \$4,854.84, against which there is an indebtedness of \$3,995.84. Of the indebtedness \$2,600 is covered by the note of the directors, bearing interest at eight per cent and \$1,395.84 is current accounts, about \$1,000 of the amount being due to supply houses.

The current expense per month for labor is about \$200 and the receipts \$74.50, showing a loss monthly, on the present basis, of about \$125. The present secretary, Mr. Crum, has been receiving \$40 per month, and if this can be cut down to \$20 it will leave the monthly loss only about \$105, to which must be added the charge for deterioration of the line and interest on the latter \$2,600, amounting to \$208 annually. It will be up to the new directors to solve this problem of profit and loss as the stockholders, by an almost unanimous vote, refused to consider the matter of raising the monthly toll, which is now only fifty cents, and voted enthusiastically to extend the line all over Union county just as rapidly as possible. As they are all successful farmers and business men we have no doubt some plan will be adopted by which this laudable purpose will be accomplished.
