DRIVERS QUIT.

by their services which has caused them many hardships and privations, and now ask to be governed by the following conditions or agreement, to follow:

First, that the employees shall receive the following compensation:
 Northwest trip \$60.00 per month, which is now \$60.00.
 The northeast trip \$60.00 which is now paid \$55.00.
 West end trip \$60.00 which is now paid \$60.00.
 East end trip to be \$60.00 which is now \$60.00.
 Old town trip \$50.00 which is now \$40.00.

Second, that the drivers are not responsible for any losses whatsoever which are not reported to driver who is held liable unless the driver is notified and informed within 48 hours from the time of such shortage or loss, so he has a chance to find or rectify any error at once.

Third, all equipment shall be kept in such reasonable repair and safe condition as not to jeopardize the life and limb of drivers.

Fourth, to give all drivers seven days notice prior to dismissal from service, all drivers to give me (J. D. Lynch) seven days' notice before leaving my service.

Fifth, that all questions that may arise be settled by an arbitrary committee to be appointed as follows:
 Two by the drivers and two by me and the fifth by the four already selected. We are to abide by their decisions.

Sixth, I hereby cancel and make null and void the agreement signed by the drivers June 5th, 1912.

In acknowledgment whereof I set my hand and seal.

 Another statement which the strikers issued today reads, with the signatures of the strikers:
 La Grande, Oregon, June 8, 1912.—Mr. Lynch, Dear Sir:—After settling our differences of June 5, and after signing the agreement as arranged by you, it was agreed by all concerned that this matter was over and that all were settled and not to be mentioned again.

Now comes Mr. Lynch and publishes in the Observer an article which is contrary to his agreement and gives us a grievance and we ask for due consideration of our agreement attached and want an answer at once. Hoping you give this matter due consideration, we remain,

New Daily for Chicago.

Chicago, June 7.—A new daily newspaper is soon to be launched in Chicago, according to credible report, that is to follow a unique policy, not editorial but business. Preparations are said to be well advanced with presses and other equipment ordered. This new daily is to depend for advertising patronage upon the merchants outside of the loop district, if reports be true, and refuse the ads of the big downtown department store and order to get the accounts of their lusty competitor in the outlying districts on the north, west and south sides. Of late years the competition of the neighborhood stores has given the loop merchants some concern and the plans of the new daily promise to produce a serious diversion of patronage to the streets where cheaper ground rents and lessened delivery expenses make lower prices possible. Already the outlying "chain" grocery houses have made great strides during recent months and with a daily newspaper that caters to their patronage merchandising in Chicago may soon enter upon a new epoch. The capital behind the newspaper enterprise is said to be ample to endure a long siege and insure success. New methods of delivery, new circulation standards and new advertisers will be required. In recent years the sceptre that rules the big dailies has been handed over to the business offices and such galaxies of "stars" are no longer found on the editorial staffs as in the days when George Ade and Malcolm McDowell, Peter Finley Dunne and Ray Stannard Baker, Forrest Crissey and "Barney" Mullaney (who was commissioner of public works under Mayor Busse) were on the job, with Schmedtgen and John McCutcheon in art art departments.

Clash in Darrow Trial.

Los Angeles, June 8.—Verbal clashes between District Attorney Fredericks and the defense attorneys, Rogers and Appel, marked today's session of the Darrow trial. Detective Franklin was sworn on the stand, and was subjected to severe cross examination by Appel. This is Franklin's seventh day on the stand and the strain is telling on him. He grew angry at Appel's questions and showed lack of memory. When Appel made a statement setting a date definitely when Franklin testified before the grand jury, he said he regarded with suspicion any information coming

Iron Appel. The court admonished him on this matter.
