KELLEY FREED FROM BASTILE

ELGIN MAN HELD NOT BLAMED FOR ELOPEMENT.

Sheriff Childers Loses Verdict in the Townley Case—Dodson Trial on.

Corroboration of the recent rumor that an Elgin man named Kelly who eloped with a married woman, also of Elgin, and was found in a lumber camp in western Idaho, was kidnapped, was substantiated this morning when he was acquitted and released from arrest. He was placed in jail to keep the peace at the time he and the Elgin woman were returned from Idaho where they were serenely content to live apart from their former neighbors.

George Craig was sentenced to one year in the county jail by Judge Knowles this morning. He had previously been found guilty of assault on Jim Slack at the sugar factory last fall. The state's Lon Dodson is the title of a case before the court today. It will be remembered that Dodson was shot at Union one evening some months ago, and the state has brought charges of attempted burglary against him. It being claimed he was shot while trying to effect an entrance into a residence at Union.

The Townley-Childers jury reported at noon today and found for Mr. Townley of Union in the sum of \$375. Sheriff Childers is held for this as an individual and not as sheriff. He was found to have erroneously served an attachment.

COMPARISON (Continued from page one) licity before election. He has since come around to the advocacy of publicity before election.

Fourth—I have favored the initiative and referendum for 16 years. He has opposed both until within the last two years.

Fifth—We both believe in the primary. I cannot fix the date when he first began to advocate it. I have been advocating it for a number of years.

Sixth—We both believe that there is a "Wall Street influence" and that there are subsidized newspapers, but I discovered both many years before he did.

In differing from men, I do not often find it necessary to question their motives. Differences of opinion on political questions can usually be accounted for by difference in bias, except when accounted for by difference in information and interest. The most fundamental bias found in men is the bias toward aristocracy or the one toward democracy on the other.

Until within a few years there has been nothing in Mr. Roosevelt's actions or speeches to indicate agreement with Jefferson in this respect. I have lately been gratified to note some change in him, but I am not yet able to judge how complete it is or how extensive an application he would not be willing to make of Jeffersonian principles.

Colonel Reads Comparison. Oyster Bay, June 8.—When shown Bryan's article on "The Differences between Myself and Roosevelt" today, Roosevelt said, "There is no way I can tell the differences between Bryan and myself. There is only one way to compare Bryan with myself and that is to compare his works and my actions."

When asked an opinion of the republican national committee on the Taft delegates from Alabama, Roosevelt said, "There is one district where their action represents naked theft." It is understood that Roosevelt is preparing a formal statement on the matter.

DISCOVERY (Continued from page one) a carnival which projects into the fountain. On either side of the shaft are replicas of two men, one indicative of the old world (an aged patriarch) while the other represents the new world (an Indian). The back of the shaft carries a medallion of Ferdinand and Isabella. Lorado Taft was the sculptor of the heroic figure of Columbus, while the architectural firm of D. H. Durham and company of Chicago drafted the general features of the memorial. The total cost was \$100,000, which sum was appropriated for the purpose by congress.
