The old Cub machine is still doing business at the old stand, Manager Chance has not been able to find youngsters that look good as to him as his veterans.

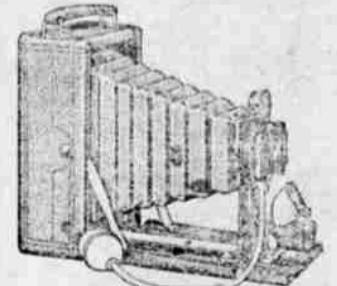
Of the \$25,000 option on the Anderson team held by President Coniskey of the White Sox, Carolina Association fans say Bull Powell alone is worth more than that amount.
