

OLDEST INDIAN WITH 101 RANCH



Probably the oldest Indian in this country is Chief Lone Bear, a Sioux Real Wild West Show and who will be here with the show on June 19. Lone Bear is a character and well known to all who have had anything to do with Indian affairs during the past half century. The Indians have no reliable way of keeping track of their exact age but as near as can be figured from historical events in his life Chief Lone Bear has left the one hundred year mile stone far behind him. He is intelligent beyond his race and has a beautiful way of telling stories of his experiences. Recently when a gentleman who had been talking to him remarked "well the Indians are much better fed since they have have surrendered than they were when running at large" the old chief

looked at him for a minute and replied:

"You are far from being correct. The Indian never was so well fed as when he was as the good God intended he should be roaming on the prairie. Before the coming of the white man the Indian garnished his table with pumpkins, corn beans and water melon, all of which were raised by his patient squaw. Milkweed took the place of asparagus and after the pod came and the cotton formed a boiled dish was concocted. Then there was wild strawberries, wild onions and Buffalo berries. The acorn of the red oak after being soaked in wood ash lye to extract the tannin was boiled and formed a substantial tidbit. We had more meat, fish and game then and what we had was just what was intended for us and we thrived not

perished as we have done on the food of the white man who neither knows food nor how to cook it. All of the white man's food is killed in taste by the stuff he puts in it and it all tastes alike. We had more to odand better food when we were in our natural way of living than we have ever thought of having since."

Lone Bear is emphatic in his declaration that had he been forced to eat the white man's food from infancy that he would never have lived to the age he now enjoys.

Section 2. It is further provided that said assessment shall become due and payable immediately after the same is entered in the docket of city liens and delinquent within ten (10) days thereafter.

Section 3. When the record of the city of La Grande shall have completed the special assessment roll in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance he shall without delay give at least five (5) days' notice in one or more of the newspapers having general circulation in said city, of the time when such assessment will become delinquent and also that said assessments may be paid in installments, provided each property owner shall make application therefor within ten (10) days from the date of the first publication of said notice. Said

application to be made under and by virtue of the provisions of chapter 5, title 26 of Oregon Laws.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval by the mayor and publication in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer, on and after the 15th day of June, 1912.

OFFICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 15th day of May, 1912, creating improvement district No. 60 and designating Cedar street, as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council on the 15th day of May, 1912, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Cedar street, in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by grading said street, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows: from the south line of Main avenue to the north line of Spring avenue.

(A) And the property affected or benefited by said improvement is as follows:

Lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6, block 2 and lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, block 5, Romig's addition to La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefited by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$740.04. That the council will, on the 15th day of June, 1912, meet at the council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment. 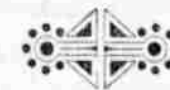
