WELL KNOWN FIRE DEPARTMENT MEMBER PASSES.

After Brief Illness End Comes as a Shock to Many Friends.

He was taken ill Sunday and neither he nor his relatives deemed the illness critical until the news of the death came as a distinct shock this morning to his many friends. Funeral arrangements have been set for Friday afternoon at 2:30 when the Elks will have charge of the interment, with assistance from the Moose lodge. The services will be conducted from the Elks hall.

Frank Brown was born in Dolgeville, New York, October 8, 1881, and came to La Grande in his early childhood, having lived here continually since, being nearly 31 years of age. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. J. White, and father, M. D. Brown, a sister, Miss Mae White, and other relatives, some of whom have arrived for the funeral. These include Mrs. Flora Smith and Miss Berdie Smith, an aunt and cousin, of Walla Walla.

Mr. Bricoux erected the annex a few months ago to facilitate matters in regard to the Savoy hotel which has its rooms over the M. & M. company's display rooms. Shortly after building the annex he sold the hotel interests and now has let go of the building, all in anticipation of going to Vale, from where he will transact desert land business. He will return to Vale Saturday taking his family with him, he having already spent a few weeks there on business matters.

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by Calhoun desired to override a majority of 77,000 California republicans which prejudiced the contest."

The national committee's vote on the contest in the Fourth California district was 37 for seating the Taft men and 16 against. Two of the Roosevelt delegates were elected by a majority of more than 69,000 in the statewide primary, and two Taft men were seated in their stead who had a local majority of 150 votes.

F. C. Bryan, a law partner of General Charles Dick, Taft's contest manager, argued for Taft. Heney spoke for the Roosevelt delegates. After Bryan was through with his argument, Senator Penrose of Pennsylvania asked him if he knew the California legislature "flagrantly and deliberately violated the law by forcing through the California primary law under the lash of Governor Johnson." Heney was on his feet instantly.

"I object," he said, "to having my state insulted by Senator Penrose, or anyone else. I won't silently permit anyone to libel Governor Johnson."

The Roosevelt men declare the action of the national committee in seating two Taft delegates in the fourth district California is a part of the plan to law a foundation of attack on the whole delegation from California and other states where the delegates were elected from the state at large. This attack, they say, is before the committee on credentials.

Flynn and Gassecock declared the electoral delegates of Pennsylvania and West Virginia will support Roosevelt in the electoral college even if Taft is nominated. Flynn said: "If they steal the roll call in this convention, we will protect ourselves. The Pennsylvania state delegation is not adjourned. We have 30 of the 38 delegates and nothing can prevent our electors voting for Roosevelt. Even if Taft's name is on the ballot, the electors are not bound to vote for him. This would mean the defeat of the national republican ticket but would save us in Pennsylvania.

Connell Lets Contracts for Sewers and Pavements.

At a meeting of the city council in executive session to consider the bids for pavements and sewers contracts were awarded to the Warren Construction company, which will mean an expenditure of \$180,890.40 for civic improvements and will give the city about 60 blocks paved with the celebrated bitulithic pavement, says the Tillamook Herald. Work will have to commence three days after the contract is signed, but it is the intention of the Warren Construction company to push the work as rapidly as possible as the street pavement cannot be done after the rainy season sets in.

This contract was let after careful investigation of the merits of other paving, and was awarded for bitulithic because of its proven worth, and because it has withstood every test of time and traffic under all climatic conditions.

In the Small Towns Sometimes Better Than in the Larger Places.
