TRAINS MOVE OVER SLIDES

DELAY LONGER THAN FIRST AN-
TICIPATED.

All Trains Registered in Before Mid-
night Following Landslide.

More time was required to clear the
landslide at Durkee than was anti-
cipated and it was 9 o'clock last night
before the first of the delayed trains
reached La Grande. All of the belated
passenger and mail trains were regis-
tered in before midnight.

Because of the congestion on the
east end, the passenger crew between
Portland and Pendleton was required
to bring No. 18 on to La Grande
where a freight crew took it on east.
Brakeman Gilliam of the Portland-
Pendleton run was a member of the
crew and had time to call on his
parents, Dr. and Mrs. J. D. Gilliam,
before deadheading back to Pendleton.

Today the train service is gradu-
ally resuming the normal, trains run-
ning about on time again.

PREVENTS COUNTER MOVE.

Darrow Trial Sees Evidence Tighten-
ed up at All Points Today.

Los Angeles, June 14.—After Judge
Hutton overruled the objection of the
defense in the trial of Clarence Dar-
row charged with jury bribing, Clerk
George Mourie of Judge Bordwell's
court was placed on the stand for the
state. He read the court records to
prove that the McNamara trial was in
progress for several days after the
alleged bribery.

Assistant District Attorney Ford
said this testimony was introduced to
forestall any attempt the defense
might make to argue it was improb-
able that Darrow would have bribed
the jurors in a case already closed.
