 O, God, help us daily by Thy power as we struggle toward the better light to be conscious of the fact that we are doing our very best and depending on Thee while aiming high and firing all the time.
 "We are continually thankful to Thee for the pageant and the progress of peace; and for the opportunity to

turn the cost of possible and continuous wars into the treasuries of our homes, our schools, our brotherhoods and our churches. We thank Thee, too, for the terror inspired in the mind of any ruler who oppresses his subjects and for the sense of relief such oppressed feels when he looks to us for a home.
 "Bless our mighty nation! Bless Thou the acts of the great conventions of Baltimore and of Chicago, causing them who are the rulers of our destinies to see that above all, Thou, O God, art interested in the welfare and the future of Thy own millions who are to be ruled by them who are to be chosen, out of the wildfire of political passion bring Thou the warmth of progressive peace and may nothing there be done to bring ultimate or even temporal dis-

Anderson Well Liked.
 Hon. Gus Anderson of Baker made the principal address of the occasion. Few present ever heard from any lips words of higher appreciation of the American emblem of "gorgeous dyes" than were vented by this eloquent Elk. Only a verbatim report of the words spoken by Mr. Anderson could do it justice for it was a condensed expression of highest eulogy of the nation, her deeds, her ability and a reasonable prophesy as to any future. It was a splendid supplement to the eulogy spoken by W. B. Sargent a few moments before. Mr. Sargent's best oratory and glittering figures of speech added much to raise the standard of the program to a fitting niche in the rung of efficiency.
 The Flag Day committee consisting of J. H. Peare, W. B. Sargent, F. Bay, E. E. Kaniesl and Chas. Gore displayed excellent foresight in picking the participants for the program as it is doubtful if any detail could have been done better.
 F. C. Bramwell read a brief history of the American flag in his characteristic manner and with the singing of "America" with band accompaniment, the audience went home feeling that for once the Stars and Stripes had been accorded fitting tribute in a day and age when political elements are prone to trample the colors under foot and hoist in their stead the red of anarchy and disorder.
