Toledo, O., June 15.—"My object in going to Chicago is perfectly simple," said Roosevelt here today as his train sped west. There is a concerted effort by professional politicians and interests for which they stand to deliberately rob the people of the victories they have won. When such is the case I didn't feel at liberty to refuse to come."

confidence. The only thing necessary is to let the outside world know of the justifiable confidence we have in ourselves. We are doing our part in this publicity work and trying to hold a worthy place in the front rank of 'boosters' for La Grande. Many other communities in the northwest, less favored than La Grande in the wealth of their natural resources, have advertised to outside capital their advantages and resources with such success that they have up to this time, far outstripped La Grande.

"While in most cases the claims made by these communities as inducements to investment and settlement have been justifiable and have resulted in greatly stimulated growth and mutual profit both to the communities and the outside investors, yet La Grande today offers greater inducements to the outside investor and home seeker than any one of these communities ever offered. The people of La Grande can profit greatly by the experience of those in more thoroughly exploited towns who allowed the outsider to step in and secure the valuable property of their towns at low prices and receive the first great profit due to the increase of real estate values at the expense of the home people, who were later forced to pay a very heavy price for their lack of foresight. Now is the accepted time. The same opportunities exist today in La Grande that existed just a few years ago in Spokane, Seattle, Portland and many another western city.
