REYNOLDS IS NEW DIRECTOR

KEEN INTEREST IS TAKEN IN ELECTION

School Clerk Reads Annual Financial Report at Meeting.

J. E. Reynolds was yesterday elected a member of the board of education succeeding President J. W. Knowles whose term has expired. The final vote, which was small up to the last hours of voting stood: Reynolds 123, N. Molitor 23 and Fred Braden 7, scattering 2, total 165. Mr. Reynolds takes the seat vacated by Mr. Knowles who has served for several years, always giving a great deal of his valuable time to the interest of the schools of the city and the students, and has seen the transition from mediocre schools to places of prominence in the state circle of learning institutions.

In addition to the election of a new director, School Clerk A. C. Williams read the annual financial report.

Summer School of the South. Knoxville, Tenn., June 18.—More than two thousand students, including teachers of all grades and branches are enrolled this year at the summer school of the south, which is annually conducted here by the University of Tennessee and which opened its session here today for a term of about six weeks, closing July 26. The school has the use of the entire plant and equipment of the university, including dormitories, dining halls, recitation rooms, laboratories, shops, libraries, museums, farms, gardens, green houses, etc.

PETERS' SHOES GEIBEL'S AMERICAN LADY CORSETS

1897-98. Colonel of the "Rough Riders" in the Cuban campaign in 1898. Elected governor of New York in 1898. Elected vice president of the United States in 1900. Became president on the death of President McKinley September 14, 1901. Elected president in 1904. Acted as mediator in restoring peace between Russia and Japan in 1905. Completed his term as president on March 4, 1909, and sailed three weeks later for his memorable hunting expedition in Africa. Returned to New York, June 18, 1910, and accepted a position as associate editor of The Outlook. Formally announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for president in February, 1912. ROBERT M. LA FOLLETTE. Born at Primrose, Wis., June 14, 1855. Graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1879. Elected district attorney of Dane county in 1880 and re-elected in 1882. Elected to congress from the Third Wisconsin district in 1884. Re-elected to congress in 1886 and 1888. Defeated for re-election in 1890 and returned to the practice of law in Madison. Became a leader of a reform element in the republican party in Wisconsin. Unsuccessful candidate for nomination for governor in 1896 and 1898. Elected governor in 1900 and re-elected in 1902 and 1904. While governor secured the enactment of laws providing for nominating all candidates by direct ballot, for increased taxation of railroad property, and for the state control of railroad rates within its borders. Resigned the governorship in 1905 to take his seat in the United States senate. Re-elected to the United States senate in 1911. Conference of "Progressive Republicans" held at Chicago, October 16, 1911, endorsed La Follette for president. ALBERT B. CUMMINS. Born at Carmichael, Pa., February 15, 1850. Educated at the Academy at Waynesburg, Pa., and admitted to the bar of that state. Worked for several years as surveyor and railroad builder. Removed to Des Moines in 1878 and formed a law partnership with his brother. Elected to the Iowa legislature in 1888 on anti-Prohibition Republican ticket. Unsuccessful candidate for the United States senate in 1894 and 1899. Member of the republican national committee from 1896 to 1900. Elected governor of Iowa in 1901 and re-elected in 1903 and 1905. Followed an independent course during his career as governor and originated numerous measures of reform. Elected to the United States senate in 1908 to fill out the unexpired term of Senator Allison. Re-elected to the senate in 1909 for the term expiring in 1915. First attracted wide attention in national politics by his declaration of the "Iowa idea," which stands for a reduction of the tariff on monopolized products.
