Chautauqua Manager Commends Riverside Park Highly After Visit.

S. Platt Jones the chautauqua platform manager came into the Obsever after a trip to Riverside park where the chautauqua is to be held and to hear him praise the park after knowing so much of other chautauquas in the east increases our pride in what we have advocated as a great benefit to our city and to Mrs. Bohnenkamp and the park ladies in being so farsighted as to its value. Mr. Jones went on to say that he went to the park expecting the distance was great and to find it only a short mile it was only good exercise. So many chautauquas in the east are five and six miles from the city and are a decided success. He mentioned the North Dakota chautauqua which is six miles from Devils Lake a city of six thousand with practically no towns nearer than eight to nine miles and the audiences averaged three thousand and for each program, and with a beautiful river and wooded grove Riverside park has a beauty spot that La Grande should be proud of. He went on to say that he met Mr. Bohnenkamp, Mr. Polack, Dr. Gillilan and Mr. Black out there making final plans for camping space and concessions. Early in the week the auditorium will be erected, lumber for the seats and stage is being taken out, and this year the seats are to be built with backs, and if a profit can be realized this season, next season the seating question will be solved by having nice folding benches that will not only add to the beauty of the park but the comfort of the people.

A special meeting was called Monday evening of the Chautauqua directors and many new plans made to make conditions at the park better than ever, and the directors urge the people to make the chautauqua time a vacation and camp on the grounds. Now the chautauqua comes but once in a year and there is no better chance to hear the best talent of the country and spend ten days among delightful people and at an expense that even the poorest can stand.
