DAY NOT FATAL.

Derrick Grounded High Power Wire  
Wire and Man Is Badly Burned

R. P. Greenwood is still suffering  
considerably from the results of in-  
juries sustained last Monday when he  
sustained a distressing accident which  
nearly cost him his life. While driv-  
ing a farm derrick with a four-horse  
team the pulley struck the main elec-  
tric wire of the E. O. L. & P. company,  
running to Cove. The power wire was  
detached and burned him seriously  
about the shoulders and feet, knock-  
ing him to the ground. The team ran  
away and the derrick was dragged  
over him. He was very much bruised  
and scarred but all considered made a  
fortunate escape. At that, one horse  
was seriously injured.

The team was stopped by J. D. Mc-  
Kennon who witnessed the accident.  
Reports today say Mr. Greenwood will  
recover satisfactorily, although it will  
require some little time for the burns  
to heal.

### MANY SHEEP ARE POISONED

LETTER FROM BURNT RIVER  
TELLS OF CRIME.

Poisoned Salt Scattered Over Range  
and Sheep Are Killed.

Baker, June 20.—John G. Hoke who  
is in the city today on official business  
for the Oregon Wool Growers' associ-  
ation is in receipt of a letter that  
states that 600 head of sheep have  
been poisoned at the range on upper  
Burnt river recently. The sheep were  
the property of Robert Stanfield, the  
large sheep holder of this part of the  
state.

According to the letter and what  
information that can be ascertained  
the sheep were poisoned by some one  
who premeditated the deed. The  
sheep were poisoned with strychnine  
salt spread over the range. Though  
the work was done nearly a week ago  
there has been no trace of the crim-  
inal since. The authorities said  
when called up about the matter that  
they had not been notified and conse-  
quently could not enlighten the own-  
ers. The wool men are much inter-  
ested in the problem and intend to  
make every possible effort to put an  
end to these actions.

Mr. Hoke also lost 15 head from  
his band the other side of Medical  
Springs June 3. They were shot by  
someone riding in that country.
