**HELP FOR TOMATO GROWERS.**

**Prof. Bouquet of O. A. C. Tells How Best to Ripen Crop.**

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore., June 25.—As much trouble has been experienced in the past by tomato growers, in ripening the crop, Prof. A. G. B. Bouquet, head of the vegetable gardening department at O. A. C., has prepared some suggestive hints for vegetable growers.

"One of the greatest drawbacks," says Prof. Bouquet, "has been the dropping of blossoms in the early summer, resulting in a meagre setting of fruit. Instead of having ripe tomatoes at the end of July and middle of August many vines do not begin to set fruit early enough to permit of ripening before fall. Much loss is thus sustained from fruit cracking from rains or vines frosted.

"Artificial aid in the pollination of the blossoms is often necessary, the poor setting of fruits being nothing more or less than a non-fertilization of the female organs of the flower. If this organ is not properly pollinated, the flower will fall, breaking off at the first joint below.

"Tomato blossoms remain open several days and the gardener may aid pollination greatly. On bright days the pollen will scatter readily if the vine is shaken or tapped with a stick or lead pencil. A high temperature often between ten and two o'clock, causes pollen to scatter much more freely, and be caught by the pistil. If pruning or staking of the vines is desired, the plants should be close together in the row, 2 1/2 to 3 feet, and pruned to a single stem by removing the laterals at the axils of leaves."

**POLITICS AND POLITICIANS.**

Texas republicans will meet in Dallas, August 13, to nominate a state ticket.

Dr. H. D. Hatfield, the republican candidate for governor of West Virginia, is a nephew of "Cap" Hatfield, the noted feud leader.

Representative E. S. Candier, Jr., of Mississippi, is the only member of the house from that state who is not a native Mississippian.

The real opening of the socialist national campaign will take place in St. Louis on June 29, with Eugene V. Debs candidate for president, as the chief speaker.

The voters of Kansas this fall will pass upon the acceptance of a constitutional amendment to establish equal suffrage, and also a spirited campaign in behalf of acceptance is being waged by the women.

The withdrawal of Thomas G. Hudson from the contest for the Georgia governorship has left John M. Slaton of Atlanta and Joe Hill Ha' of Macon as the only candidates to fight it out in the coming primaries.

Theodore P. Armstrong, who served a term in the national house of representatives some years ago, has announced his candidacy for the democratic nomination for governor of Delaware this fall.

After seventeen years in politics, Governor Robert S. Vessey of South Dakota intends to retire from politics at the end of the present term of office and will engage in mercantile business in the east.

Thomas Sterling, who has been chosen by the republicans of South Dakota as their candidate for United States senator to succeed Senator Gamble, is a brother of Representative John A. Sterling of the Seventeenth Illinois district.

Benton McMillan, who has been honored with nearly all of the important public offices within the gift of the people of Tennessee, is again in the field for the democratic nomination for governor of that state.

It is an interesting coincidence that both Harry S. New, late acting chairman of the republican national committee, and Victor Rosewater, who succeeded him, are the sons of former members of the republican national committee.

The only ex-confederate who ever presided over a national political convention was Donelson Caffre of Louisiana. The convention was that of the Sound Money democrats who nominated Palmer and Buckner in Indianapolis in 1896.

Representative A. P. Fujo of the Seventh Louisiana district, whose name will long be remembered in connection with the "Money Trust" investigation, is to retire voluntarily from congress at the expiration of his term next March.

George Wingfield, the new United States senator from Nevada, was born 35 years ago in Fort Smith, Ark. He was a "cow puncher" in Oregon before he landed in Nevada, where he accumulated a fortune estimated at \$15,000,000 as a result of fortunate mining speculations.

**Prof. Churchill to Give Lecture.**

This meeting is one of the prominent educators of the state. Mr. Churchill will give, on July 3, one of three lectures on the "Re-organization of the Common Schools,"

Two-Ton Federal Here Now and Six-Ton Packard to Arrive.

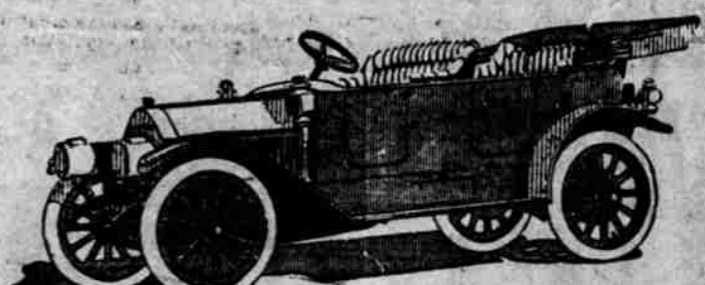
