TRUSTY McIVOR TAKES SECOND

GAME IN WEEK.

Wonderful Batting Rallies Redeem La Granders Yesterday.

With excitement galore attending, and more hilarity and shouting than has been manifest since Western Tri-state clubs first performed in La Grande, the Pippins broke even in the Walla Walla series by taking the third victory yesterday afternoon. The performance is commendable in view of the fact that the tallenders have been dealing with the leaders all week, and for the first time broke even in a series since the league was born. Imagine 28 bingles from singles to triples, ten free transportation to first, two balks, a wild heave or two, exemplar base running and inside baseball, boneheaded performances that were very, very amusing, eight or nine errors and some umpiring that was shady, and you have about all the ingredients that were visible in the compound dished out as baseball. Certainly no game ever attained the white heat of excitement this one did.

Trusty McIvor was on the hill top and made it two straight victories for himself in the series. He at plenty on them to keep out of danger and insofar as his pitching was concerned was at no time in serious danger of defeat. His teammates behind him helped to get him into the mire occasionally and then helped him out.

Pittman, whose offerings were straightened out for a victory early in the week, lost the game for Walla Walla and when he was derricked in the eighth, it was too late, for the damage had been done. Kelly essayed the redemption role but failed. Big "Hap" Smith scored Barry after the manager had himself singled in the first, but the truck raisers came back in the second with Martin's double scoring Johnson who walked to first, and the spaghetti man himself scored on a balk, or what Gove said was a balk—which amounts to the same thing. From there to the fifth La Grande was helplessly worshipping at the shrine of Pittman, but broke the spell when Forbes doubled and McIvor's grounder was muffed up. In the sixth the slaughter that La Grande gave the Walla Wallans was sweet to behold. Bludgeons worked with clock-like regularity until all had batted and five runs scored. Walla Walla created a rally that inning, too, and chased four over, tightened teamwork coming to Pittman's rescue. He was going deeper into the mire every inning and his end came in the eighth. Four hits in the ninth came near tying the score but Mensor put a stop to it with the second of a brace of sensational catches around second.
