The president plans to remain at Beverly until the first of next week, when he will return to Washington for the remainder of the present session of congress. As soon as the lawmakers have finished their labors, which they are expected to do at an early date if the present hot weather continues, the president will lose no time in rejoining his family in the Massachusetts coast town.
