LOAD OF SHOT WOUNDS MAN

FOREIGNER, PROBABLY ITALIAN, SHOOTS HENRY BUESING.

Free-for-All Fight Precedes Attack on Buesing.

Henry Buesing, aged 25, a rancher, was shot with a heavy charge from a shotgun, Jack Smith, "Happy" Bolton, a machinist, and Howard Bates, all La Grande people, were more or less badly cut and bruised as the direct and indirect consequences of a free-for-all fight between Italians and some of the white men mentioned yesterday evening. Buesing, the most seriously hurt, was an innocent sufferer, the police believing he was shot by mistake, the would-be assassin thinking him to be one of the party participating in the free-for-all, near-riot fight just a little while previous. The shooting of Buesing occurred on Jefferson street near Fourth while he was approaching the business part of the city, the assassin firing across the street from a pile of barrels near the quarter of the O-W. section gang. But for the fact that the distance was so great, Buesing would have been murdered instantly, the scattering of the shot alone saving him.

The young man is well known here, living on a ranch with his brother Charles and brother-in-law, Ed. Myers, and has a large circle of friends

who will be keenly interested in the developments of his case.

Police on Scene Early.

A squad of three policemen was just leaving the scene of the shooting. They were called there by disturbances at the section gang and Italian quarters but found everything quiet, though they searched several foreigners in that vicinity. They were on their way back to town when the shot was fired and they hurried back to find Buesing prone on the sidewalk bleeding badly. He was hurried to the hospital and a search for the assassin commenced. A shot gun was found in the quarters of some Italians but it had not been fired recently. The gun and shells were confiscated and search instituted for the weapon used in the shooting of Buesing. It was daylight before the actual weapon was found, however, lying near the pile of barrels from where the load of lead was shot. This weapon, too, is in police headquarters.

Chief of Police McLachlin was called to direct the search and one suspect was arrested, but he is not thought to be the one who shot Buesing but perhaps a participant in the general fight. The theory exists that the foreigner who did the shooting had gone to his shack to arm himself and on emerging from his quarters saw Buesing and fired at him with obvious intent to kill, thinking him one of the participants in the previous fight.

Buesing is resting easily today. The only serious complication that might result would be blood poisoning, and this cannot be finally said to have been avoided for several days to come. The main charge seems to have struck him in the fleshy part of the leg, some scattering down to the calf of his leg and other shots striking his hand. The shot used were exceptionally large, probably No. 4 shot. Scattering shot penetrated an inch board in a shack occupied by a negro near the sidewalk on which Buesing was walking. The other men are not seriously hurt, it is believed. Bolton wears bandages on his head today and Smith is said to be badly cut though nothing of a critical nature exists.

San Francisco, July 5.—Three armed and masked robbers entered the Southern club, an incorporated poker club here, early today and robbed the keepers and guests of \$800. No trace of the robbers has been found.

Well-Known Colorado Suffragette Operated Upon at San Francisco.

San Francisco, July 5.—Mrs. Sarah Decker, the noted Colorado suffragist and reform leader, ill here with intestinal trouble since Monday, was put under the knife today.

Salisbury, England, July 5.—Captain G. B. Lorraine a sergeant, and Major Wilson, both of the British army, were instantly killed today while flying in an army aeroplane near Stone Henge.

One of the side planes became warped and the aeroplane turned turtle. Both men were jarred from their seats and fell 40 feet, being instantly killed. Captain Lorraine was one of the best known of the British army aviators and had made numerous flights throughout the country. The aeroplane in which he was killed was a Nieuport monoplane. 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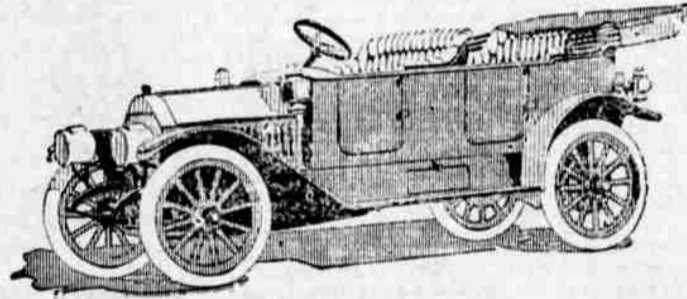
