HEADQUARTERS HERE REPORT EXCELLENT PROGRESS.

Mrs. Wade Finds Attentive Listeners and Students at Park.

Chautauqua week has done much to spread the propaganda of political equality in Union county, thinks Mrs. Wade, the district campaign manager, who came over from Pendleton to establish headquarters here last week. Mrs. Wade said today:

"It has been a great pleasure to the representative of the Club Women's Campaign committee to meet at the chautauqua park so many of the thinking women of the community, and to find them fully appreciating the great progress that has been made all along the line, everywhere, in regard to the political equality of women."

"They listen with the greatest interest, and these are the women who have not heretofore been attracted to the cause, and they are adding very much to the weight and influence of the present campaign. There has been no defection from the ranks of the former advocates, but this accession of so large a number that have not before been counted, makes glad the hearts of the old line workers, and it makes sure the beginning of the end of campaigns in Oregon. It is more than likely that Ohio will win 7th place on the suffrage flag, but Oregon can be 8th, if all depends on the personal work of the women. "Ask your fathers, your husbands, your brothers and your sons, they will not refuse your personal request. "And this means you."
