Pendleton, July 11.—(Special)—Strange things happen in baseball and it happened here yesterday when Etchandy the cast off heaven, won for Pendleton against the team that brought him to Oregon. Maxmeyer should have won as he was going good all the way, allowing eight hits.

Mensor Said to Be Lazy. However had it not been for the off-color holding of Mensor, a Pendleton castoff on the Pippin lineup, the game might have resulted differently, for that player's laziness was directly responsible for three runs.

Maxmeyer, Barry's eccentric twirler "graced" the slab for the visitors, and was no more liberal with his hits than his opponent, but was not accorded the superior support which was given Etchandy.

Pendleton earned the first run in the second, by Wilson's triple and a double steal. Another came in the third, by a pass, a single, and Mensor's boot. The Pippins tied the score in the fourth by connecting with Etchandy's curves for a double, a triple and a single.

Games Goes in the Sixth.

In the sixth La Grande dropped the game. Two more men got on by short singles, and with two down Mensor loafed on Wilson's slow grounder to second. The ball went for a hit and allowed two runners to cross over.

Real Reason Why New Empire Rules at Walla Walla

Umpiring in Walla Walla is far from child's play, according to Billy Gove, who has returned to Boise after a brief experience as an indicator in the Western Tri-State league, says the Boise Statesman. Billy says the fans, newspaper men and Walla Walla players demand that an umpire must be a homer or they will have none of him.

"I got along nicely in La Grande," said Gove, "only that my legs got a little sore from running around on the diamond there, which is about as hard as concrete. When I got to Walla Walla my troubles began. Home players refused to do as they please there, and an umpire who tries to lay down the law immediately gets himself 'b' bad."

"No sooner had I disciplined a couple of the Walla Walla men than papers and fans got after me. They were prejudiced against me in the first place because I came from Boise and nothing would have made any difference."

"Had it not been for my bad feet I would have stayed it out, but as it was I decided I would do better to resign. Fred, the man who referred me, is good on balls and strikes, and his boss decisions seemed to suit the Walla Walla bunch."

"I understand that Golden is a very good man and I hope he will do well. I have heard that he is a strict official, and that is what the league

needs. "There is bad feeling arising between Pendleton and Walla Walla. A good many Pendleton fans were present at the Fourth of July games, and they do not believe their players were given a square deal. On top of that, the evening paper at Walla Walla called Lodell and two other Pendleton players 'roughnecks' and the Pendleton people are sore. When Walla Walla gets to Pendleton I am afraid it behooves the Bears to be pretty meek and docile in their behavior."
