MOOSE WIN FROM 'LOIDIES'

MAN PITCHER STOPS RUNS BUT TOO LATE.

Three Female Members of Visiting Troupe Peers of the Game.

La Grande's Moose team got away with the Boston Bloomers in a reasonably good game of ball yesterday afternoon, winning by a score of 6 to 5. The Bloomerites made the prospects of the Moose very much dubious in the ninth canto when Miss Maribly the left fielder, lifted out a three-base drive that under ordinary circumstances would have meant a homer. The fielder broke into prominence suddenly for she had been going very unobtrusively, the chief interest centering on Miss Barth, who opened at center field, but relieved the south-law, Miss St. Clair in the fourth. These two are fully as capable on the field as the average boy. Miss St. Clair opened the twirling game and for two innings had the Moose batters calling from her hand with a combination of swift-breaking curves. Then she was solved and three hits in the fourth was the signal for Miss Barth to natural heavier, to swap places with Miss St. Clair. She was solved more quickly than her predecessor, and the management derelict Miss Barth in favor of a man named Livermore and then it was all off. He was a strikeout artist and had the Moose completely at his mercy but the damage had been done. With three men in the lineup the Bloomers present a formidable front, but they have three exceptional fielders. Miss Fay at first takes ground and high throws equally well and Miss St. Clair's sprinting abilities were some of the marvels of the game. Eleven seconds to the hundred, is probably her possibilities. Miss Barth took second base, retiring Miss Happy and low throws were scooped up with marvelous accuracy. The Moose got precious little sympathy from the grand stand and the record crowd in attendance was all for the girls. However, they put up a good game at that and deserved to win. Carter, Squires, Conley and Bruce did the hitting that won the game. The visitors put three over in the third inning principally because the Moose were unaccustomed to the abbreviated Texas leaguers that were rapped out in quick succession. A short slow drive that was hard to field, got the team into holes several times. The fielding features of the entire game was a running scoop-up by Bruce which he spooled by a wild throw, but it would be a sin to errorize the fielder after his sensational stop, shutting off a two bagger, easy enough. 
