Ice Trust Opposes City. Schenectady, N. Y., July 15.—"Cheap ice for the poor," became a war cry of the socialist administration of Schenectady today and the whole city is stirred by the attempt of the organized ice dealers to prevent Mayor Lun and his officers from carrying out his plans.

The administration stored ice last

winter and started to sell ice this summer to sell ice at 25c a hundredweight while the dealers put the price at 40 cents. "They want an injunction to prevent our selling ice to the people," said Mayor Lunn today, "and the injunction will not be argued until July 23, but we will continue the fight."
