point back to the small beginning now in progress. He illustrated his point by citing Lewis & Clark as they entered this northwest country over a century ago and compared that beginning with the splendid conditions of the present time. He closed his remarks by presenting the people with the library and asked that they make good use of it.

A response was offered to the judge's remarks, after which Mrs. A. L. Richardson delighted the audience with a vocal selection, meeting with the usual success. The evening closed with the singing.

Dr. Loughlin, who has been the head of the library work and who is rightfully termed the father of the institution, reviewed the work of the committee explaining every detail of the library's growth since the first committee meeting. Over a thousand books are now on the shelves and these books are being eagerly read by several hundred people. Most of the magazines and periodicals are taken by the library and it is found that they attract many people. The doctor stated that it is the intention this fall to apply to the Carnegie committee for funds to erect a building. Before doing this, however, it is essential that a certain number of books be in circulation and that the library is a healthy concern.

Miss M. L. Cowell, the librarian, made a short talk in which she not only explained the rules of the institution but called attention to many important features which heretofore the public had not been familiar with. Following the program those in attendance spent a couple of hours explaining the volumes and discussing what is best for the library's future. It was unanimously agreed that the committee, under direction of Dr. Loughlin, deserved a great deal of credit for having taken up the matter and pushing it to a point where there is no question as to its future success.
