 E. D. Selder, a member of the Elks crowd at Portland has returned from the metropolis.

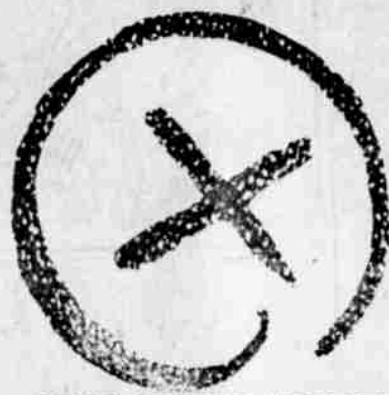
To Fertilize Potatoes.

Farrow the ground for planting and distribute in the row. A good method is to put the fertilizer in a tight bag, swing it over the shoulder and make a small hole in the lower corner that will let the fertilizer run as the workman walks along the furrow. Then drag a log chain along the bottom of the furrow to mix the fertilizer with the soil and to straighten the row. Where the field is large enough to justify the use of a common two-horse corn cultivator attach chains to the stocks and let them drag in the furrows. When applications of fertilizers exceed 500 pounds per acre broadcast and harrow in one-half and put the other half in the row.—National Stockman and Farmer.
