'SHINE', ESOLA HOUR'S IDOL

FIELDER COMES IN TO SAVE THE DAY.

When Hit Is Needed Second Baseman Helps Twirler Get Results.

Accepting the helm of the La Grande baseball craft in the third inning, two-down, "Shine" Harmon pitched the Pippins to victory yesterday afternoon with the assistance of a sward-burning drive through Etchandy's glove by the nifty little second baseman, Esola. Incidentally La Grande got even with Etchandy, the big Frenchman, a former team-mate, for two defeats administered at Pendleton last week, and because of the fact that it was a ninth-inning victory it made the game both exciting and satisfactory to the home bunch. Fox was sent to the hospital in the third with a badly lacerated thumb sustained when he was forced to receive a dreadfully warm liner on his bare hand. Harmon came to the mound and kept the books without an entry on the Pendleton side until the eighth. Up to the eighth he allowed two scattering hits.

Etchandy Is Good, Too.

But Harmon was not alone in pitching good ball, for Etchandy was going better than he ever did for La Grande. His hits were well distributed over the course of the game and non-were better than one base. Esola led off with a scratchy single in the second and Barry sacrificed him. Luttrell scored him with a peppery drive good for a base. It was well along in the game again, the sixth in fact, when La Grande got another one over, and that time Etchandy was party to blame. Luttrell hit again but went out stealing second and Smith fanned but Harmon got a walk. Cannon's hit to Robinson wandered through that player's feet and allowed Harmon to advance after he stole second. From third the idol of the hour came wandering home when Esola sacrificed.

Pendleton Ties Things up.

Then Harmon got the only inning with nervousness written on it that he had. Robinson was an easy out but one of Harmon's shoot caromed off Lodell's shoulder and put the captain on first. Nadeau then drove out a long hit that should have been a single but got by Smith and he went to second, Lodell coming home. Nadeau scored—and you will notice he is generally mixed up with the scoring business—when he poled a long fly to King who had taken Harmon's place. La Grande didn't connect in the eighth but shut Pendleton out in the ninth, although a little bit wobbly in doing it.

Esola Is Big Stealer.

Then came the last of the ninth and the score tied. Forbes fanned but Naughton got transportation and King sent him down to second with a well-placed hit. Thus two were down and things looked gloomy, they sure did. But Esola found one to his liking and drove it straight at Etchandy who tried to stop the bullet but it went through like water through a sieve and meandered off to the outfield. 
