Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Lockwood leave soon for a camping trip in the hills.

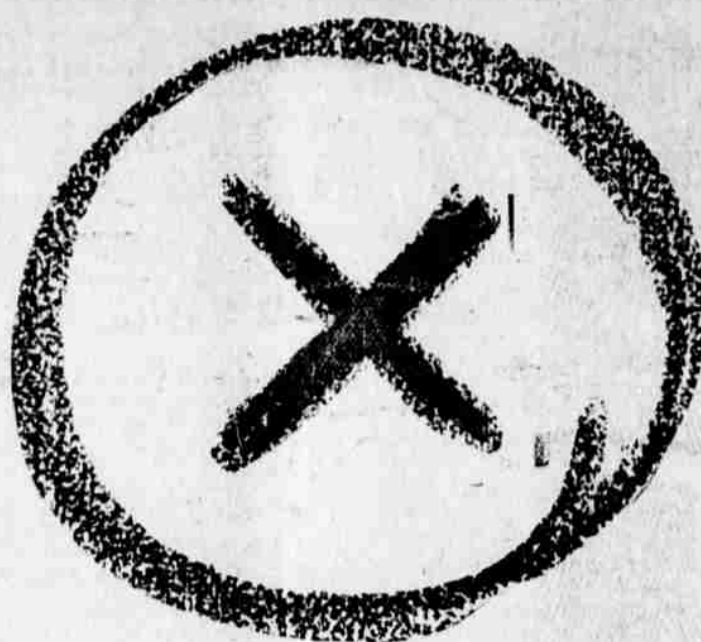
