Sunday Game a Thriller.

Coming up from behind again like she did twice before last week, La Grande battled herself into victory yesterday afternoon before a small crowd. A better game on either side no one would want to see. Remington, a new pitcher, commenced the game for La Grande and in that inning Pendleton put over three runs, using Robinson's two bagger, Lodell's single and a wild pitch along with four free transportations to do the business. Mountain displaced the uncertain Remington, however, and after walking one man settled down to the best pitching he has ever done. Not only was he going like a house afire but the eight men behind him were up on their toes. The three run lead was equalled in the fourth by the Luttrell, Smith, Harmon, King batting combination and from in each but the eighth of the succeeding Innings brought the total to six. Pendleton put one over in the ninth, the only run after the first inning by a duo of walks, a hit and a sacrifice.

Mountain got into tight holes twice but got out in the finest shape through good pitching and tight support. His backers were like adamant

Mountain did much to win his game yesterday by two well-placed hits. He is not naturally a batsman either.

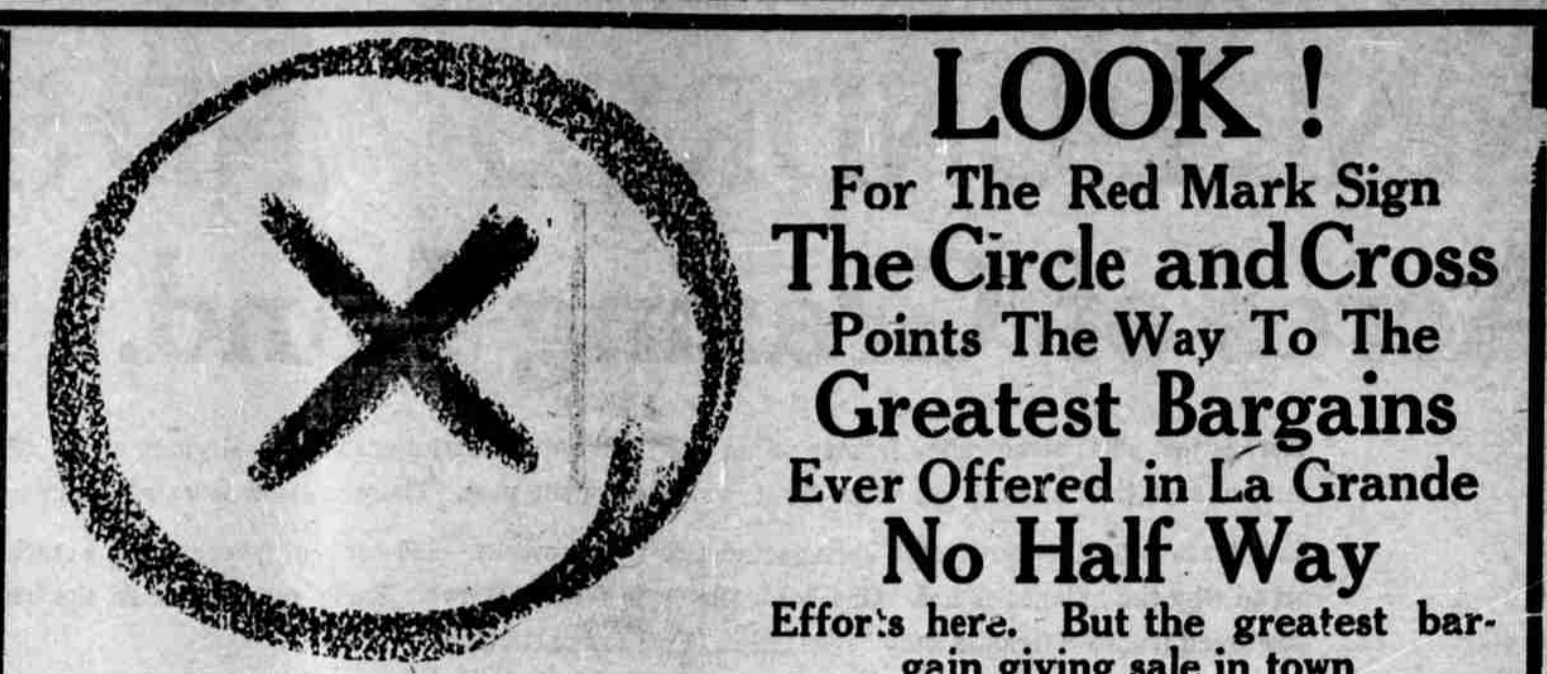
President Sweet was here from Boise and saw the game yesterday. He went home this morning.

LAND MARK IN FARMING SOLD

THE SELDER PLACE NEAR COVE BRINGS \$20,000

J. W. Bush, Local Creamery Man, Will Open Dairy Farm.

J. W. Bush, through the George H. Currey real estate agency has purchased the J. M. Selder farm in Cove, the price paid being \$20,000.00. This is recognized as one of the finest dairy farms in the county. It is well improved, much of it fine land and well watered. Mr. Bush contemplates importing two carloads of choice dairy stock from the east. Being a manager of

the Blue Mountain creamery, Mr. Bush knows that there is money in producing cream as well as in the manufacture of butter and he proposes to clip a profit on both ends of the industry. Thus another pioneer farm passes into other hands. Mr. Selder took up the greater portion of this farm under the government land laws and lived there over a quarter of a century. He is now living in Portland, having retired from active life after becoming financially independent from the products of this farm.

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
