## A FAMOUS HOTEL CLOSED.

The Arlington, in Washington, Long a Political Headquarters.

The Arlington, Washington's most famous hotel, has closed its doors forever. The old structure is to be torn down, and a \$5,000,000 hotelery will take its place.

For more than forty years the Arlington has entertained its scores of great men. For more than half that period it was the diplomatic headquarters of the capital, and until it closed it was the abiding place of the most noted people regardless of the new palatial hotels.

On the site of the main section of the present house formerly stood three stately mansions, writes the Washington correspondent of the Baltimore Sun. One was occupied by William L. Marcy, secretary of war under President Polk; another by Lewis Cass, secretary of state under Buchanan, and in the third dwelt Reverdy Johnson, the brilliant Marylander who was attorney general and minister to England. Next door is the old home of Charles Sumner and Senator Pomeroy. Close by is the old British legation. Here lived Sir Bulwer Lytton and his son, Lord Lytton, and here he wrote his celebrated poem "Lucile."

Between 1870 and President McKinley's time practically every president went from the Arlington to be inaugurated. The late Speaker Thomas B. Reed died at this hotel, as did Senator Mark Hanna; a former secretary of state, Walter Q. Gresham, and a former postmaster general, Henry C. Payne. Senator Root lived at the Arlington for years, as did Senator Aldrich.

For many years the Arlington was the center of diplomatic interest. Li Hung Chang stayed there with his suit of 100 Chinese valets, cooks and other attendants. During the Russo-Japanese war Prince Fushimi of Japan had a whole annex of the Arlington for the conferences.

J. Pierpont Morgan never went anywhere else in Washington, and James J. Hill had rooms there always. Andrew Carnegie preferred the Arlington.

## FIRING AERO BOMBS.

Two Methods Are Undergoing Tests by French Army Experts.

Highly satisfactory results have just been obtained in the series of experiments carried out to test several methods of dropping bombs from aeroplanes on a given spot. Though the air far from having reached perfection, two appliances, invented by the Farman brothers, have already given great satisfaction to army experts.

Details of their mechanism are, of course, kept secret, but as regards one of them it is known that the method employed is that of, first of all, locating the target by dropping a dummy bomb, which on exploding spreads out a white powder easily visible to the pilot.

This bomb once dropped, the machine is turned back, and the pilot, knowing his height by his barograph and the speed at which he is flying, can by means of an aiming apparatus and the ordinary principles of gunnery locate his next shot to a nicety.

The other apparatus, much more complicated, requires to be handled by an experienced officer and therefore can only be employed in two seated aeroplanes, carrying, besides the pilot, a bomb dropping specialist.—C. F. Bertell in Leslie's.

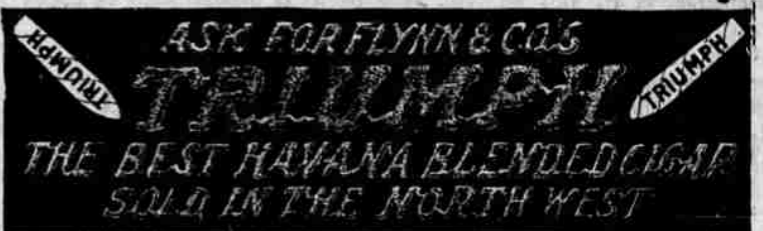
