THINGS FUNERAL.

(J. D. Gillilan.)

Kansas is at the last end of few processions, and the first in many. Now comes Wichita with a word of common sense on the matter of the much abused funeral ceremonies so common as never yet to have become proverbial. The people of that community hated by the clergy are attempting the production of a reform along the following lines:

"Unopened caskets at funerals;
Fewer flowers;
Not to exceed 30 minute addresses;
Only immediate friends to accompany body to the cemetery."

To this the writer adds some words that will not please all who should read it. There are lots of buzzards in every community who can scold a dead body every time; they are never seen at any other sort of public function. It is their delight to "march up" and with one eye on the casket, the other on the mourning friends, take careful inventory of every detail from the estimated cost of the coffin, its interior trimming, the dress of the deceased, the look on the face and all other gruesome appurtenances, even to the appearance of the friends and "how hard they take it." It is one of the most wearisome acts of my ministry of now more than 30 years to have to endure such semi-savage acts on the part of the truly disinterested and boorish "mourners." All this pertains to the services at the churches. There are more objectionable actions when the service is to be conducted in what is intended as the privacy of the home. At these times the same buzzards appear. They boldly stalk into homes and rooms where they never could have daylight entrance otherwise. They use the occasion as license to peep into every door, inspect furniture, and sometimes are found actually pilfering small articles as "souvenirs" of the scene.

There are some who really love them that are gone and for the sake

of that love actually desire to look once more on the face that has been a blessing and a source of comfort; but the rabble ought to be excluded. I hope my face shall never be uncovered at a church funeral, but if it is, I would like to come to life long enough to shoo the buzzards away, or to rise up and make a face at them.

Each of us is curiosity enough when we are alive, and ought to cease to be such after we are dead.

The people who ought to read this will never do so, for they are not intelligent enough for it.

Speaking of funerals, permit the writer to add that there is another reform that must come along that line and the sooner the better. It is in the matter of the expense of the affair mortuary. It is a reform of the hardest kind to meet and to change for the reason that it is considered right and proper for the deceased to have a costly laying-away. By far the most costly article of furniture some people ever bought is the casket which is placed in the ground to decay. It is not the fault of the undertakers for they are in the business merely for the accommodation of the public. A hundred dollar funeral is not unusual in very poor families. Grief never counts the cost, a fact the undertaker and the grief-stricken often discover when bills are due. No register is expressed as that would not be polite. Twenty dollars is a big expense for the ordinary casket. I mean one actually needful for the occasion and lumber would sell high even in that case. People of too moderate means are often embarrassed for months and sometimes for years just because they felt the unwritten demands of society in matters funeral.

One man I know buried his wife in a casket costing \$1,750. He was wealthy, to be sure, but why should that waste of money be made? One will say it is an expression of love. Love should be reasonable. Was this? "Why this waste?"
