The millers got a man past second in the first inning but he died just prior to Slate's long two-bag drive and the side was retired with no scoring. Hal Bohnenkamp was chased over the plate in the first for the Clerks, on a walk, a steal and a drive from C. Berry's bat that was fielded back in time to catch the runner at first. Francis was delegated to circumnavigate the paths in the second on a three base drive that he converted into a complete score when Fife overthrew third base on the play in. In the third the lumber makers tied things up when they got Bell to first by receiving a bender on his portside and then stealing second. Claycombe lifted a high pop just behind second, scoring Bell. A moment later Bolton mused up A. Johnson's single and then overthrew first, accounting for Claycombe's safe arrival at the home station. That was all the scoring the Palmerites did, but in the fourth the Clerks came over with three runs sending Bohnenkamp home after his hit and steal when A. Johnson overthrew third on C. Berry's hit and run play. Francis hit out a scratchy bingle again, scoring Berry and Reynolds who hit a single, came home when A. Berry put forth the second two bagger of the evening.
