DIXON AFFIRMS WILSON'S FAVORITISM HAS LAGGED

Wilson's Popularity Deemed to Be Insufficient and Platform Does Not Appeal to the Voters—Strong Labor Plank to Be Inserted in Roosevelt's Contract.

Chicago, July 27.—The prediction that a Southern Progressive will be nominated to the vice presidency by the Bull Moose convention, was made today by Senator Dixon of Montana, manager of Roosevelt's campaign forces. He anticipates a big industrial progressive vote to result from a special plank to be made by workmen of the country.

Dixon said: "Wilson reached the crest of his wave of popularity five days after the nomination. He has been losing ground ever since. The democratic nominee is not popular personally and his platform does not appeal to the people. Incidentally there are no cheers for Taft, either."

Sea Girt, N. J., July 27.—With his speech of acceptance written in his own shorthand notes complete, Governor Wilson arrived at his summer home here today to bring to an end the period of seclusion which he went into when he started his address. The speech will be printed Monday.

Senator Gore of Oklahoma conferred with Wilson this afternoon. It is considered likely he will manage Wilson's western campaign, with headquarters which are to be established at Denver or San Francisco.

ENGLAND WITHDRAWS DEFL.

Washington, July 27.—Charges d'affaires Innes of the British embassy here notified Secretary Knox today that Great Britain will not protest the free passage of American vessels through the canal beyond a formal note which already had been presented. A British note to Secretary Knox, long ago, tended to show discrimination in tolls and violates the Hay-Pauncefote treaty. Canal legislation will probably pass congress at once.

INCUBATOR TO NEST IN 162 DAYS IS RECORD.

Fred King of South La Grande Sees a Record Development.

From an embryo state when the egg was placed in the incubator, to a stage in the development of that embryo where it had assumed the form of a real and much alive pullet, laying eggs in the brief period of 162 days, is the record of several trap-nested White Leghorns, propagated by Fred King of South La Grande. In February, the 14th, to be exact, Mr. King placed the eggs in the incubator and today chicks hatched from that batch have grown to such proportions of maturity that they laid eggs. The record is a remarkable one, and Mr. King prides himself on the record of his chicks. The pullets are healthy and strong.

HANFORD CASE MAY YET END IN REMOVAL

RESIGNATION NOT ACCEPTED BY TAFT AS THOUGHT.

PRESIDENT WILL AWAIT RETURN OF SUB-COMMITTEE

Evidence Heard at Seattle Will Be Weighed Before President Taft Accepts Resignation of Seattle Jurist—Letter has Reached President Taft Today, Say Reports.

Washington, July 27.—President Taft may reject the resignation of Judge Hanford if it is shown that the jurist would likely be impeached if the proceedings against him were continued. It was learned today that the Hanford letter of resignation has been received by the president.

The president's action will be deferred until the sub-committee which heard the evidence, returns to Washington.

Mr. Taft will confer with the committee and decide whether to have the impeachment proceedings renewed, or to accept the resignation.

Women Mistreated When Bloody Fight Slaughters Miners

DETROIT HOT BED OF GRAFT AND BRIBERY

TEN COUNCILMEN ARE UNDER ARREST FOR CONSPIRACY

SEVERAL CONFESS TO THEIR PART IN AFFAIR

"Didn't Know It Was Wrong" Say Some of Those Under Suspicion—Grafting Has Been Common for Years—Burns' Detectives Uncarried Grafting After 4 Months.

Detroit, July 27.—Two of the ten city aldermen arrested on a charge of accepting bribes and a conspiracy to accept bribes for votes in the passing of the measure where city property was recently transferred to the Washburn railroad, have confessed according to a statement of the police today. It is said that three others have made a partial confession and two other aldermen are expected to give in this afternoon. The accused were released on \$5,000 bail. Burns' detectives have been working on the case four months.

Alderman Ginnman's wife, who is an invalid, collapsed when her husband was arrested, and her condition is critical. According to confessions so far, the graft in the council was common, some aldermen going so far as to assert they didn't know it was wrong.

Ten aldermen were arrested and arraigned today in police court, and remanded until Monday. Burns' detectives declare that seven have confessed, revealing city grafting which has endured for years.

Honor Helper of the Deaf.

Paris, July 27.—An interesting celebration will be opened in Paris tomorrow to mark the bicentenary of the birth of Abbe de l'Epee, inventor of the deaf and dumb alphabet. The celebration will last four days and will include an international congress of deaf mutes, which will be attended by delegates from many countries. Abbe de l'Epee was the first of the great teachers of the deaf and dumb. He was educated for the priesthood, but took up the work of teaching the deaf and dumb before the field had been entered by anyone else. He was successful and invented the manual alphabet, which was a great aid in his work and has since remained a standard device.

BEST LOAF IS WANTED

Unassisted Girl of 16 or Under Can Earn \$15.00.

More prizes are being hung up by local business men in response to appeal from the Union County Fair association for special premium money in the county fair in addition to those already presented. One was added today when William Miller offered a \$15.00 cash prize for the best loaf of bread made, unassisted, by a girl of 16 years or under. The first prize will take \$10, and the second \$5.00. DARROW TRIAL HALTED AGAIN

DEFENDANT ONLY REMAINING WITNESS.

Defence Will Rest Its Case Within Ten Days Is Belief.

Los Angeles, July 27.—There was no session of the Darrow trial today. Attorney Rogers announced that Darrow will be the next witness in his own behalf and it is possible that the case will go to the jury within ten days.

Rogers also stated that while there might be a few unimportant witnesses, the testimony of Darrow will virtually close the case for the defense.

BATTLE NEAR END.

Reds Seem to Have Advantage of the Mock Warfare.

Centralia, July 27.—The deciding battle maneuvers are in progress today. The Blues are making a final stand at Black River near Gate City. If the Blues this afternoon fail to defend Black River bridge the war will practically have been won by the Red invaders.

Washington guardsmen with the Blue army and Idaho guards with the Red, who thus far have been in reserve, went into action this afternoon. Until this time the fighting has been borne by the Oregon guards and regulars. Since the fighting opened yesterday the defending army has been steadily retreating and this morning the scene of the fight had shifted to two miles east of yesterday's conflict. The Reds now have 100 Blue prisoners. The Blues have taken 40 prisoners.

GREAT STRIKE OVER.

After Much Suffering and Hardship, Strike Ceases.

London, July 27.—The great London dock strike ended today. It has lasted ten weeks, and hundreds of thousands have suffered, and business has been badly crippled. There is no explanation of the settlement.

Later in the day it was announced that the man had returned to work when the strike committee recommended resumption, declaring that the employers had promised to consider their grievances.

NUMBER SLAIN UNKNOWN BUT THOUGHT MANY

MILITIA ORDERED TO THE SCENE BY THE GOVERNOR

PRESENCE OF TROOPS ONLY PREVENTATIVE

Stories of Frightful Abuse of Women and Children Are Coming to Charleston by Slow Methods—The Wires Cut and Verification of Rumor Is Hard to Establish Today.

Charleston, W. Va., July 27.—With telegraph and telephone service down, making verification difficult, it is reported here that a dozen so far have been slain in the Paint creek section in the clash of the miners with the detectives, where nearly a dozen are already dead. The rattle of musketry is continually heard, and women and children are fleeing.

Governor Glasscock is alarmed and has ordered three companies of militia to the scene. More than 2,000 miners struck April 20 but there were no disorders until the arrival of the detectives. Stories have been told of frightful attacks on the women and children, and this, it is said, is responsible for the clash between the detectives and the strikers.

Just how many miners were slain today, if any, is unknown. It is known that two detectives have lost their lives—William Stringer and Gus Plinson, and Wm. Phaup is injured. Adjutant General Allott, and 26 militiamen are encamped at Mucklow.

Hope of restoration of order depends on the arrival of the militia, it is believed. Around the mouth of Paint Creek, residents charge that private guards are guilty of depredations.

Actor Some Scrapper.

Los Angeles, July 27.—"Jack" Barrymore, an actor who is starring with a local stock company, today pleaded guilty to assault and will be sentenced Monday. Barrymore became entangled last night with a barber at a local hotel. Eye witnesses say the actor had the better of the fist fight.

AMMUNITION HELD ON LINE

MEXICAN OFFICIALS REFUSE TO ALLOW TRANSIT.

Arms and Munitions of Warfare Destined to Americans Held up.

Nogales, Ariz., July 27.—A large shipment of arms and ammunition, consigned to the United States consul in Sonora to be distributed among the foreigners of that state for protection in case of trouble with the Mexican rebels, who are swarming the country in small bands, is held here today by the Mexican customs officials.

It is understood between the United States and Mexico that arms would be permitted to enter Mexico but the customs officials have received no notification from Mexico City, and refuse to allow them to go through.
