

HERBST FAMILY HERE AUG. 6TH

EUROPE HAS BEEN ENTERTAINED BY THEM.

Union Girl, Favorite in Germany, to Give Recital.

Mr. and Mrs. Godfrey Herbst, recent arrivals from Weimar, Germany, will give a recital at La Grande, on Tuesday evening the 6th of this month. They come here under the auspices of the ladies' guild.

Mr. Herbst is a violinist of international reputation, member of the grand ducal court theatre in Weimar, and a soloist of rare talent.

Mrs. Herbst, formerly Ina Wright of Union, is well known in Oregon, having given concerts here on the occasion of her former visits to America since she has been living abroad.

Her career in Germany as an opera and concert singer, and as a vocal teacher, has been one of exceptional success.

Following are a few press notices of both artists, which will show in what esteem they are held in Europe: (From *Weimarische Zeitung*, Weimar, Germany.)

The performance of the recently discovered seventh concerto of Mozart's—which had been lost since his death 95 years before—in which Mr. Herbst proved himself to be a violinist of excellent qualities—was of exceptional interest. He controlled the difficulties, which occur in the shape of octaves and accords with the greatest ease, and warmth and fervor are noticeable attributes of his playing. The kind co-operation of the violin virtuoso, concert master G. Herbst of the court theatre in Weimar, who is soloist of the Interlaken orchestra for the summer, lends especial interest to the program. He has already proven himself a first-class artist in the big "Kursaal" concerts, achieving a great success last night in the soloists evening with his masterly reproduction of the famous Mendelssohn concerto.

It will doubtless prove a thorough pleasure to all to hear this artist in the organ recital, especially as he plays, among other numbers, Beethoven's incomparable F major Romanza.

CHERRY TRADE GROWING BRISK

FOURTEEN CARLOADS OF CHERRIES SHIPPED OUT.

Many Contracts for \$70 Per Ton Are Signed up.

Union county is rapidly becoming renowned for her delicious cherries. Her products are in demand from both east and west, and contracts for five years are being made daily, with the growers on a basis of \$7 per ton, 3/4 cents per pound. This is a most profitable figure when this price means delivery in bulk at the designated shipping points.

Fourteen cars have been shipped so far this season from La Grande, and undoubtedly the shipments from other points in the valley will equal this amount which means that no less than \$40,000 have been passed to the credit of the cherry growers of Union county during the past three weeks.

Not a few of the cherry orchards are netting the owner from \$600 to \$800 per acre, which accounts for the increased acreage during the past two years.

Those who attended the Cove cherry fair a few days ago need no further demonstration as to the product that this county is shipping to the various markets of this country.

This year the fruit men—whether apple, cherry, pear, prune or peach producers—are exercised to their utmost to care for their crop and the total shipments will exceed all former years, whether measured in dollars or volume. The apple crop this year is conservatively estimated at 800 carloads. A few years more and this will be trebled when the young commercial orchards come into bearing.

The Pippins fielded a sensational game, and but for the work of the batteries they played as good ball as did the irrigators. The only error was a wild peg to second by Fitchner, a pitcher who was playing out of position behind the plate. Early in the game King saw that Fox's splitter wasn't breaking for him, but he is short of pitchers and could not change.

Notwithstanding the loss of Barry and Smith, the La Grande team looks stronger than when it was here before. It ought to win many games before the season is over.
