

POLICE FORCE PUT TO TEST

ROSENTHAL MURDERS MUST BE CAUGHT SAYS WALDO

FAILURE TO PRODUCE SUSPECTS WILL END IN DISMISSAL

Clean Sweep of New York's Detective Force Is Threatened by Commissioner Waldo Who, Actuated by Public Sentiment, Demands That Suspects Be Brought to Justice

New York, Aug. 2.—Charged with being one of the four assassins of Rosenthal, "Whitey" Lewis, whose name is Frank Sledenshue, is being sweated today as to knowledge of the crime. Lewis was apprehended near Fleischmann, N. Y., and arrested last night.

Stirred by the widespread criticism of the police since the Rosenthal murder and by the declaration of District Attorney Whitman that he wishes to rehabilitate the credit of force, and that he will catch Rosenthal's slayers, Commissioner Waldo has sent out a general order today to his 10,000 men that Horowitz and Rosenzweig, who are alleged to have killed Rosenthal, must be caught immediately. Failure, he threatened, would result in a clean sweep of the detective bureau and the installation of new men.

REBELS HOLD MORMON TRAIN

REFUGEES FROM MEXICO CITY WAYLAIED.

Rebels Turn Back Train Taking the Refugees From Rebel Territory.

El Paso, Aug. 2.—Rebels of South Casas Grandes today turned back a Mexican Northwestern train bearing Mormon refugees and distributed army rations among them. Two thousand federals have reached Madera and are prepared to take Juarez and then attack the rebels at Casas Grandes.

Japs Suicide to Show Their Love

Tokio, Aug. 2.—To show their love and devotion to the late emperor, and grief over his death, many Japanese are planning suicide, according to a story published today in the Asahi, a leading newspaper. The police, the article says, have been ordered to take precautions to prevent the carrying out of the plan of wholesale self-destruction.

14,000 CHICAGO MEN TO STRIKE

VOTE TODAY INDICATES STRIKE IS WANTED.

Surface and Elevated Lines Involved in Dispute.

Chicago, Aug. 2.—More than 14,000 employes on the surface and elevated lines are voting today on whether to strike or not. President Mahon of the Amalgamated Association of Electric and Street Railway employes announced that the early voting indicated the men are overwhelmingly in favor of walking out. The result will be announced tomorrow.

Negotiations for a new contract between the company officials and their employes have been proceeding since June 1, without agreement.

ANARCHISTS BEHIND ATTACK

STREET DISTURBANCES IN CHICAGO GROW.

Keeping in Background Emma Goldman Incites Disorder.

Chicago, Aug. 2.—Recent street disturbances in various sections of the city, are attributed today by the police to Emma Goldman and Ben Reitman, the anarchists, who under the guise of socialistic meetings have inspired bitter attacks upon the city police department. Miss Goldman and Reitman have been keeping in the background since their arrival here, but according to the police are secretly conducting the street speaking campaign which is against the city regulations.

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"EAST is east and west is west," but in spite of Kipling the twain do meet occasionally at American national conventions. The accompanying illustration presents an example. The dark man in light clothes at the left is Manuel L. Quezon, delegate from the Philippine Islands to the Democratic convention. The tall, rawboned veteran at the right is Colonel Bill Fairman of Punxsutawney, Pa., who was a delegate to the Baltimore convention, as he has been to conventions of his party for the last seventy years. Both of the delegates were objects of interest to their fellow delegates and to spectators—the one because of his age and the other by reason of his foreign appearance. The representation of the Philippines in the convention was due to an error in the call under which the delegates were summoned. Up to this convention "imperialism" has not been recognized to the extent of admitting Filipino delegates. Senator Quezon is a Nationalist and is resident commissioner in Washington for the islands.

DARROW DENIES BRIBE CHARGES

Los Angeles, Aug. 2.—When the third day of the cross-examination of Clarence Darrow opened, Assistant District Attorney Ford at once plunged into the relations between the defendant and Guy Diddinger, a Burns' detective, who testified he was bribed by Darrow to give up some keys, and demanded other evidence seized in the Indianapolis raid when John McNamara was arrested.

Darrow has denied he bribed Diddinger to give up exhibits but admitted he hired a Burns operative to tell him what was going on in the Burns camp.

Ford introduced telegrams exchanged between Darrow and W. J. Turner, a detective who had been employed by Darrow in the Haywood trial at Boise and who brought about an introduction between Diddinger and Darrow.

HILL LINE IS TALKED AGAIN

CONNECTING LINE BETWEEN UNION AND HILL ROAD.

Oregon Capitalists Said to Be Obtaining Washington Rights of Way.

Oregon capitalists are obtaining rights-of-way in the vicinity of Northern Pacific holdings at Walla Walla and rumors have been revived relative to the construction of a Hill line joining the Union Central at Cove, and connecting the Hill lines at Walla Walla. Present rumors have it that the line will cross the Blue Mountain divide and skirt the foothills near Walla Walla until it reaches Dudley Spur, seven miles from the Garden City.

That such a venture would meet with popular favor here, is of course beyond question as it would give competing lines from this county to outside competing lines and that it is also much desired at Walla Walla is an attested fact. Only recently Walla Wallans were freely advocating an electric line to perform the functions the proposed railroad would do. The recent movement for an electric line had its inception when a Walla Wallan hired a taxi and scooted to La Grande, Elgin and Joseph returning with great enthusiasm for a connecting line of some sort.

GRACE TRIAL OVER.

The man claims to have been discharged day before yesterday from the Washington state penitentiary at Walla Walla. The police are waiting for further developments.

DISCOVERY DAY TO BE OBSERVED

HOT LAKE TO HOLD CEREMONY AUGUST 8TH.

Pioneers of Eastern Oregon to Be the Guests on That Occasion.

Hot Lake, Aug. 2.—(Special)—On Thursday, Aug. 8, there will be held at Hot Lake, the centenary anniversary of the discovery of the now famous sheet of hot water by white men. Last December Baker observed the centennial of the coming of the pioneer party of Wilson Price Hunt to the Powder river valley, and the following year the discovery of Hot Lake is noted, although the Hunt party passed it going westward in January, 1812, probably without noting its existence. The discovery is understood to have been made by the Peter Skeen Ogden party going eastward in a fur buying expedition.

There will be assembled there this year, upon the occasion of the anniversary, the pioneers of Union and Baker counties, and men interested in historical subjects from Oregon, Idaho and Washington. The principal address will be delivered by Judge Stephen A. Lowell of Pendleton. The ceremony of the occasion will be under the auspices of the management of the Hot Lake sanatorium.

Old Folks to Gather.

On that day the Union County Pioneer association will assemble at the Lake for its annual session and the usual good time which annually is looked forward to by the trekkers, is assured.

GERMAN WORKMEN KILLED

Test Applied to Building Fatal to 22 Workmen.

Nuremberg Germany, Aug. 2.—Twenty-two workmen are known to have perished today and 70 were injured with many missing as the result of the collapse of a machine factory. The walls gave way under a test of strength which officials applied to the building.

CONFERENCE WITH PARTY LEADERS INVESTIGATES ACTION

EASY DAY BEFORE THE CANDIDATE TONIGHT

Roosevelt Will Appeal to Electors in Forty States to Carry Campaign Through to Success—Colonel Expects to Deliver Five Hundred Speeches During Campaign Period.

Sea Girt, Aug. 2.—Governor Wilson today announced that he will not resign the New Jersey governorship before the election. His decision followed a series of conferences with state leaders. "I am gratified," Wilson said today, "at the receipt of a number of pledges of support from members of the Champ Clarke League of California."

Colonel to Keep Busy.

Oyster Bay, Aug. 2.—Personal appeals to the electors of 40 states will mark the campaign of Roosevelt for the presidency. This was announced today with the further details that he expects to deliver 500 speeches during the tour. Roosevelt said that the Taft speech of acceptance was dismissed as a dead and not a live issue. The colonel's declaration on the negro question will be published tomorrow. It is indicated he will not ally himself in the south but will demand more liberal treatment of southern negroes by the politicians.

WILSON HAS A QUIET DAY.

Conference With Prominent Democrats Only Duty.

Sea Girt, Aug. 2.—Governor Wilson will have a comparatively free day today. This afternoon he will confer with Senator Culberson of Texas, Senator Hoke Smith of Georgia and Congressman Clayton of Alabama at a conference with Secretary Davies of the national committee last night the governor outlined his campaign plan for the coming election.
