COAL DEMANDS ARE ENORMOUS

SIX THOUSAND TONS USED LAST MONTH.

Four Hundred Cords of Slab Wood Being Stored This Summer.

July saw approximately 6,000 tons of coal consumed as fuel to provide the O-W. motive power between this point and Huntington on the east and Umatilla on the west. This enormous quantity of fuel is taken from the storage fuel in the bunkers where many thousand tons are kept "on top". The consumption during the month of July was not more than ordinarily used, finds Storekeeper J. H. Martin, and some notion of the total year's requirement in the fuel line for this point of the O-W, is obtainable from the July estimates.

Supplying Kindling Wood.

Four hundred cords of slab wood to be used as kindling in lighting fires in the engines is being put into storage for fall and winter use.

PENDING TRADE PLEASES ALL

THE DEATH ORCHID.

Its Lethal Odor Has the Effect of a Powerful Narcotic.

The death orchid of the Venezuelan Indians has been proved to be no mere campfire yarn.

Years ago an orchid hunter, Grayson, set out to find "El Lugar de los Flores Venenosos"—that is, "the place of the poisonous flowers"—which was said to be located in the dense and pathless wilderness occupying the vast stretches between the headwaters of the Orinoco and the Andes. Two weeks passed without any incident out of the ordinary. But one morning there was a perceptible smell of flowers in the air. When the orchid hunter and his Indians camped that night the jungle smells had been entirely lost in the cloying scent. Many of the band refused to go farther.

As Grayson and the others proceeded the rankly sweet and oppressive odor became stronger, attacking the senses like a narcotic. One after another the remaining Indians collapsed till only Grayson and the guide were left, pushing onward. The orchid hunter felt as if he was being pulled by the insidious power of opium, but retained enough consciousness to become aware that, gleaming through the trees ahead, he saw flowers of huge size and vivid colors, many most distinct of them hanging in trails.

It was the death orchid. When he recovered his senses he found himself being carried back to camp, where the rest of his party had remained. Many of the band were severely sick and many had died with the continued effect of the scent.—Suburban Life.

ACCESSORIES FOR SUMMER TOILETS.

White Frills and Belts Donned With Colored Costumes.

No one seems to have tired as yet of the white accessories which have been one of the most striking characteristics of the earlier season's fashions. With colored gowns and suits white frills, white collars and cuffs, white buttons, white belts, even white jewelry and shoes and gloves, as well as white hat trimmings and white parasols, continue to flourish. Brown linen suits and linen suits in old Chinese blue are deservedly popular with such accessories.

Buttons do much this summer in helping out colored or colorless schemes. White waists with striped or colored collars have buttons that match the collar in tone. Where touches of bright color are desirable, lines of tiny buttons repeat the hue of the vivid linings that appear in turned back revers, collars and cuffs. Colored ball shaped buttons are also continued in favor for such purposes. On evening gowns one finds buttons made of a single flower or of a group of little

flowers, often with pendent buds dropping from the center. These trim skirts and waists and often catch back draperies.

In coats smart styles multiply, but a few ideas that dropped out in the spring are still among the leaders for summer. Notable among them is the black coat of satin or chiffon lined with white satin, which appears in the plainly finished flat collars and cuffs. Such a coat has no dangerous rival when it comes to its style and usefulness with lingerie gowns. Bright red coats with black belts are one of the smart things for black gowns. A great many coats, by the way, are belted and belone in the Russian blouse class, although they may have departed materially from the original type.

And, speaking of popular fancies, one cannot pass by the "pork pie" turban, which is seeing the light again—the turban that used to sit high on the Empress Eugenie's chignon. It is usually black with white trimmings, but the girl of today pulls it low over her head, perching it over one ear, where it sits higher than anywhere else.

Some of the newest veils show a light embroidery in both gold and silver thread. The foundation of the veil is a pale biscuit colored tulle or fine net, patterned with motifs of floral sprays in white silk with the outline in very fine metallic thread.
