

Bull Moose Convention Started

CONVENTION SESSION BUT 3 HOURS LONG

BEVERIDGE DELIVERS KEYNOTE SPEECH AFTER NOON

ADJOURNMENT UNTIL NOON IS THEN TAKEN

Little Done but Preliminary Organization at the First Session—Details Gone into Tomorrow Plan Now—Many Women Among Delegates—Chicago Women Carry Banners.

The Coliseum, Chicago, Aug. 5.—There was enacted this afternoon in the vast, big coliseum the first details of placing in the national field a new party ticket with Colonel Theodore Roosevelt at its head. Sounding the keynote of the party, and hearing the first vibration of the squabble over the southern negroes as delegates constituted all the excitement that took place during the first session.

Oregon Delegation on Hand.

At exactly 11:47, the Pennsylvania delegation marched in, the first to arrive, closely followed by the Oregon, Maryland and Kentucky delegations. All carried scarlet and red bandanas and handkerchiefs. All seats on the floor were filled and the aisles were jammed. Two hundred and thirty-two women ranging in age from 15 to 50 marched into the hall from the art institute and carried yellow banners, on which were inscribed the words, "Votes for women."

Before the delegates assembled the New York delegates held a caucus and adopted resolutions declaring no person will be nominated for the executive or legislative offices in New York unless they were regularly enrolled rolled progressives.

It is not known how many women are attending the convention as delegates but there are at least 20. Dixon called the gathering to order at 12:15 following a short speech by Dixon. O. K. Davis read the official call for the convention. Temporary Chairman Beveridge followed making the keynote speech of the convention.

He said in his opening words: "We stand for a nobler America. We stand for an undivided nation. We stand for a broader liberty, a fuller justice. We stand for social brotherhood as against savage individualism."

BECKER'S PLEA OF NOT GUILTY WITHDRAWN AND PLEA WAIVED

New York, Aug. 5.—Arraigned on a charge of murder in connection with the killing of Herman Rosenthal, Lieutenant Becker of the police department, who is charged with plotting the crime and paying the assassins, today withdrew his plea of not guilty and then waived his pleading. Judge Bain before whom the case was called, immediately transferred it before Judge Mulqueen who continued the hearing until Wednesday.

John Hart, Becker's counsel, presented two motions to the court. One attacked the indictment and the other demanded the right to examine notes of the grand jury hearing on which the indictment for murder was based. It was announced today that the coro-

RUNNING MATE HONORS FALL UPON "HIRAM"

LUKE WRIGHT CONCEDED TO BE OUT OF THE RUNNING

ROOSEVELT DICTATES MANY DETAILS OF THE AFFAIRS

Without Being a Candidate for the Office It is Believed Johnson Will Be Choice of Roosevelt for Running Mate Hence the Choice of Convention—Deemed Good Vote Getter.

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Just before the Bull Moose convention was called to order by Senator Dixon of Montana, at noon today, it seemed almost certain that Governor Johnson of California, would be the vice presidential nominee. Although General Luke Wright of Tennessee was being advocated by the southerners for Roosevelt's running mate, a majority of the delegates favored the California executive because of his campaigning abilities. Johnson flatly denied he is a candidate for the nomination but it is believed that if Roosevelt says the word, he will fall in line.

Roosevelt Is Supreme.
The last word concerning the nomination rests with Roosevelt and his choice for second place will be the one named by the delegates. Roosevelt's domination over the convention will be complete. Not only will he name the vice presidential nominee and permanent chairman of the convention, but will decide whether the new party shall take the name of the National Progressive party or perpetuate the name of "Bull Moose."

We stand for an intelligent co-operation instead of a reckless competition. We stand for mutual helpfulness instead of mutual hatred. We stand for equal rights as a fact of life instead of a catch word of politics. We stand for the rule of the people as a practical truth instead of a meaningless pretense. We stand for a representative government that represents the people. We battle for the actual rights of man."

When Beveridge finished speaking at 3:10 p. m., the invocation was delivered by Rev. Dr. Dornsbliker. It was a long address, and some of the spectators tired of standing and began ap-

A North and South Party.

NEGRO CROWD REFUSED ALL VOTE RIGHTS

FLORIDA LEFT WITH OUT VOTES BY REVISED DECISION

LILLY WHITES FROM MISSISSIPPI ARE SLATED

Delegates Will Buy Way Into Convention and There Fight on the Floor for the Right to Vote at the Convention—Negro Leader Predicts Victory—Many Delegates Are Farmers.

Chicago, Aug. 5.—The national committee resumed its consideration of the temporary roll at nine o'clock today. It is expected that the contests will be completed in time to present the list when the convention is actually under way. The lobbies and hotels are crowded early today.

Farmers Don't Know.
Of more than 1200 delegates a majority are from the rural districts and admit they know nothing of the convention proceedings.

Negro Question Settled.
The provisional national committee of the convention settled the Florida contest by seating the negroes as "supplemental delegates." This means they may be named members of committees and participate in debates, but will not vote. It is expected that the Mississippi contest will be settled in a similar manner.

Boss Delegates Tabooed.
The negro delegation from Florida decided to buy tickets to the coliseum and make a fight on the floor for seats in the convention. Mississippi negroes will probably take the same action, according to Perry Howard, a leader.

A blow at bossism was struck by the committee when the Lightner delegations of the First and Second Chicago districts were seated. Evidence showed that "Boss" Cox, of Cincinnati, had backed the anti-Lightner contestants.

Florida Finally Ousted.
At noon the provisional national committee reversed its earlier decision, deciding to oust both the Florida delegations, leaving the state without representation in the convention. The committee then seated the "lilly white" delegation from Mississippi but passed a resolution criticizing the action of Committeeman Midge of Mississippi for calling the convention for whites only. Francis Heney of San Francisco introduced a resolution providing that hereafter each state shall decide the qualifications of its own delegates

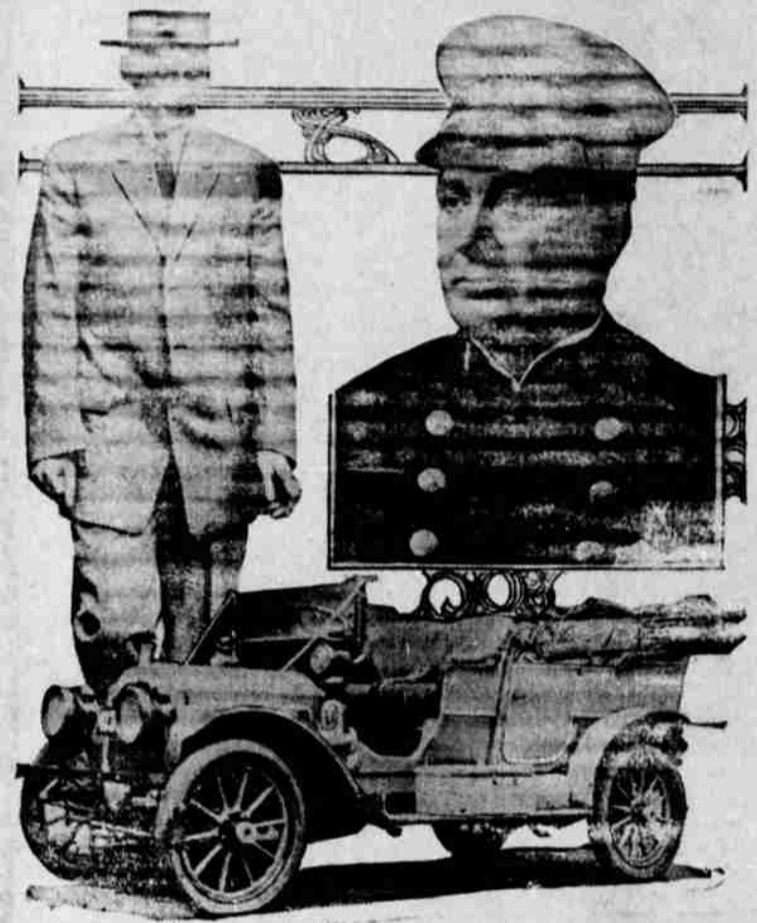
plauding at 1:25 p. m. Dixon had named Beveridge the temporary chairman and when the temporary chairman began speaking practically every seat was occupied and cheering was frequent. Temporary delegates in all states seemed unanimous against fusion with any other parties on state issues.

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Auto Used In Murder of Gambler In New York—Figures In the Case

THE murder of Herman Rosenthal, a New York gambler, stirred the big city perhaps more than any other crime of recent years; not that the victim was one member of the underworld made any difference, but because of the sensational revelations that promise to develop from the trial of his taking off. Rosenthal had been prevented from doing business by a man who is termed "oppression" He finally "squealed." He had the doubtful honor of Police Lieutenant Charles A. Becker, head of the squad assigned to raid gambling houses, was his partner. A few hours after the murder he told his story to the grand jury Rosenthal was a partner in a party of five men who escaped in an automobile. Jack Rosenthal, by Rosenthal as Becker's man to see that the police officer got a square deal of the proceeds, admitted upon being arrested that he had hired the "oppression" on the night of the tragedy. The investigation is expected to disclose the "system" under which New York gambling has been conducted in connection with the police. COLONEL IS RECEIVED BY GREAT CROWDS

BLUSHES EN BAND PLAYS "MUSICFUL"

PREDICTS TOTAL ERADICATION OF OLD GUARD NOV. 9

Roosevelt Reaches Chicago and Great Crowds Receive Him at Station and at His Hotel—Automobile Carries the Colonel Before Admirers—Band Causes the Colonel to Blush.

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Five thousand people greeted Theodore Roosevelt when he stepped from the Twentieth century limited at 8:45 this morning to attend the Bull Moose convention. The former president refused to talk politics, but hurried in an automobile to the Congress hotel.

The colonel literally had to fight his way through the jam of humanity, and Roosevelt and the party jumped into an automobile and were rushed to the Congress hotel. Another crowd awaited him there. As his auto ran up and down the street to give the crowd a chance to see the colonel a band struck up "Oh, You Beautiful Doll."

"The colonel flushed and smiled and standing bareheaded in the sun, the colonel said in part: "It is a pleasure to be in Chicago again, this time at the birth of a new party instead of the death of an old one. By the fourth of November the ticket nominated here six weeks ago will no longer be a factor in politics. Americans will not tolerate fraud or theft.
