Next Thursday the annual gathering of the pioneers of Union county will be held at Hot Lake. This is the centennial anniversary of the discovery of the now famous health resort. In commemoration of that discovery and in honor of the early settlers who have prepared the wilderness so that the present magnificent sanatorium might be a reality, Senator Walter M. Pierce, manager of the Hot Lake sanatorium opens his halls and grounds to the pioneers on Thursday.
