### Pendleton Won't Quit.

"Pendleton won't quit; the sentiment is unanimous; the money is raised and everybody is happy." Such is the word from Pendleton today, following a meeting last night of fans to handle the baseball situation.

The word was passed to Pendleton

fans yesterday that for the purpose of deciding whether or not the Pendleton team would remain in the Tri-State league until the end of the season, a meeting of fans would be held last evening in the rooms of the Commercial association and every person interested in the game was requested to be present to lend his voice one way or the other.

At present the Bucks' club is just about even with the board but there are three more weeks of the season after the present one and the receipts from the games will not be sufficient to meet the expenses. Therefore, in order to continue until the end, citizens had to come to the rescue.

"There is a decided sentiment against 'throwing up the sponge' inasmuch as the other three cities in the league have announced a determination to finish, even La Grande with a tallent team declaring they will fight to the last ditch. Should the local team be disbanded, it would mean that any chance the club might have of selling a player to a higher league would be lost, as such action would make all of the players free lancers. Should the league 'blow up' the franchise granted to it would be forfeited and organized baseball would probably be killed for several years here in Pendleton," remarked a Pendleton paper yesterday.

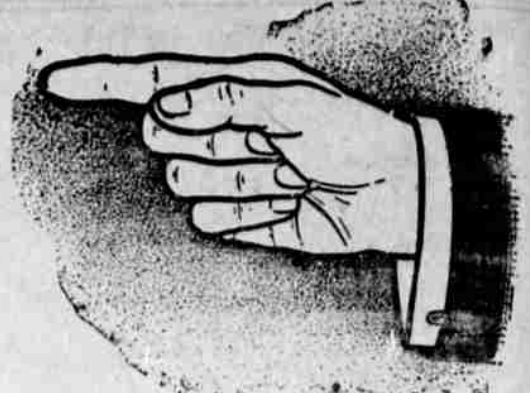
