CANAL RATES DISCUSSED.

Senate Takes up Railroad-Owned Toll Question at Panama.

Washington, Aug. 9.—The senate this afternoon took up the proposal to prohibit railroad-owned vessels from using the canal. Senator Poin-dexter of Washington opened the debate detailing the alleged railroad discrimination against the Pacific coast. He said the railroads give a better dock fare and more favorable through rate and quicker service to their own vessels, so that independent lines cannot compete. "The only possible remedy," asserted Poin-dexter, "is to absolutely prohibit their own ships competing in water lines by the railroads."

Berlin, Aug. 9.—Kaiser Wilhelm left Essen, where he was attending the Krupp centenary, today and proceeded at once to Gertz visiting the injured men rescued from the coal mines.
