

PICKERS SCARCE CHERRIES SPOIL

CROP, HOWEVER, IS UNUSUALLY
LARGE AND PRICES GOOD.

Supply of Cherries in Local Markets
Will Soon Be Exhausted.

Reports from the orchards near Cove, the greatest cherry center in this section of the country, state that the supply of pickers has been unusually short for the entire season. Many of the cherries are now spoiling on the trees on account of a scarcity of pickers. The crop this year was unusually large, however; but the late cherries have suffered from lack of prompt attention.

Cherries in the local markets are holding their price, but the supply will soon be exhausted.

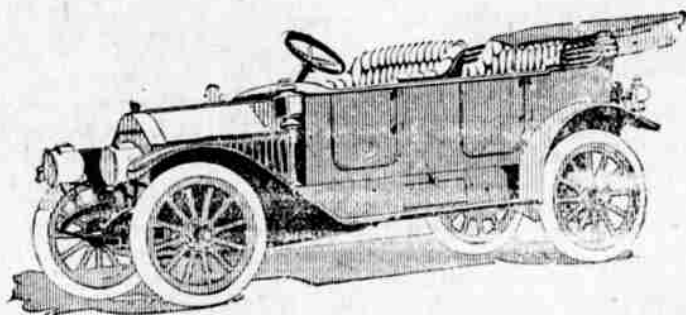
