A PRIZE WINNING DAIRY HERD AT THE SPOKANE INTERSTATE FAIR.

There's something about the climate of this great Inland Empire which seems to agree with cattle as well as people, and dairy cows especially appreciate it. Many of the best milk records are now held by cows bred and raised on the Pacific slope, and northwestern breeders confidently expect soon to hold most of the world's records. Many milk cows will be entered by their ambitious owners in the milk test to be held at the Spokane Interstate Fair during the week of Sept. 30, and this test promises to be a keen contest. Any milk cow is eligible, either grade or pure bred, and each cow entered will be given credit both for butter fat and for milk produced. All tests will be made in public by the dairy department of the Washington State college and every possible opportunity given to the public to learn all about how the test is run and what record each cow is making.

A model creamery will also be operated every day in the dairy department, which will actually show the most improved machinery and the latest methods for making butter. Two hundred and thirty-five dollars is offered in cash prizes for butter and cheese, and there are separate classes both for home-made and creamery made butter.

Every other branch of the live stock industry will be well represented at the Spokane Fair, as entries have already been received from Canada, Montana, Oregon, Idaho and California, and it will tax the fair management to find space for all the animals entered.
