The hitting proclivities of the Pippins in the last two innings was worth watching and eliminating the first three innings, the teams were well matched, though, of course, the sh-fred good pitcher, Mays, had the best style and gait of all.

COUNTY COURT GIVES FAIR \$750

PETITIONED FOR BY BANKERS, BUSINESS MEN, FARMERS.

Ask County Court for \$1,000 to Help Defray Expenses of Fair.

Judge J. C. Henry of the county court yesterday gave to the Union County Fair association \$750 upon a petition of many business men, farmers, bankers and others for an amount of \$1,000 to help finance the county fair. In view of the fact that every effort is being made by the directors of the fair to make this year's event a great success, the plan of the fair having been greatly changed so as to hold the fair on its own grounds with permanent buildings, a race track and other additional features, all of which require time and money, the county court saw fit to grant the prayer of the petition to the amount of \$750. The fair directors greatly appreciate the aid from the county and will make the best of what they receive.

The Union County Fair Association is incorporated under the laws of the State of Oregon and is capitalized at \$20,000, divided into four hundred shares at the par value of \$50 each. This stock is for sale at the par value and is now owned by residents of Union county.

This association was organized for the purpose of uniting and concentrating under a permanent and responsible management the promoting of the resources of Union county, and to hold annually a Fair where the products, live stock and various industries can be exhibited, the people afforded a week of amusement, the cultivation of products of the soil, as well as the breeding of high grade livestock, encouraged by the offering of premiums in the way of cash prizes, diplomas and other awards of merit.

The association owns, in the city limits, a twenty-six acre tract of land, on which are splendid buildings for Fair purposes including a fine grand stand, race track, exhibition building, stables and other necessary equipment.

The Aim of the Association.

The intention is only to encourage the cultivation of commercial products and the breeding and raising of pedigreed and highbred stock, but if the display were confined to these alone it would be very small, and the majority of the residents of the county would not be permitted to exhibit; but competition will induce others to improve their conditions and thus the Fair will accomplish much good along that line. Every effort will be made to secure displays of all kinds and classes allowed to compete, so that the visitors may see what Union county can produce and what diversity in farming is practiced. An invitation is extended to every resident in the county to exhibit and compete for the premiums.

Important to Exhibitors.

It is very important that all persons intending to make exhibits should read very carefully the Rules and Regulations in order that they may be clearly understood and much confusion thus avoided on the entry day and up to the time of the awarding of premiums. Monday, September 9, will be the designated entry day when all the entries should be made with the clerks and the tags placed upon exhibits. On that day no public program will be carried out and the grounds open only for the exhibitors and their assistants. All exhibits should be in place by Monday night in order that on the following morning (Tuesday) the Fair can be opened without delay.

Space in the Exhibition Hall may be secured by making application to the secretary who will confer with the superintendent of the building. Make your reservation for space early so that the Superintendent may be advised in regard to arranging the booths in the hall.

Positively No Gambling.

No questionable shows of an immoral nature will be permitted on the grounds during the Fair and no games of chance where money is displayed, exchanged, borrowed, loaned or extorted will be allowed. The officers of the Fair will protect the patrons by refusing to allow games of that nature, but if they should be discovered it is expected that the person finding them in operation will report

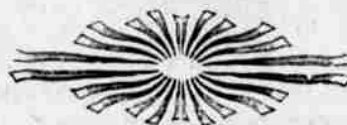
