HOG PRICES ARE RAISED

MORTGAGE RAISERS BRING INCREASED FIGURE. Spring Fries Threatening to Lower Other Fowl and Cattle Steady.

In the local live stock market this morning hogs have increased at least 50 cents per hundred pounds. Light hogs are bringing eight cents and heavy hogs are demanding six and a half cents. Several large buys have been made at these figures. Cattle are staying with last week's prices. The prices of fowl are the same, but indications point to a fall in spring fries before long.

Skeletons For Doctors. The mode of preparing skeletons for the use of the medical profession is a very delicate operation. The scalpel is first called into requisition to remove the muscular tissues. Its work being done, the bones are boiled, being carefully watched meanwhile that they may not be overdone. After this antiseptic procedure they are bleached in the sun. Even the spots of grease are sure to appear when they are exposed to heat. The French treat these with ether and benzine, securing thereby a dazzling whiteness, which is a distinguishing mark of their skeletons. A brass rod with all the proper curvatures supports the spinal column. Delicate brass wires hold the ribs in place. Hinges of the most perfect workmanship give to the joints a graceful and lifelike movement. Cleverly concealed hooks and eyes render disjunction at pleasure possible. The whole construction plainly indicates the care and skill of an artist and connoisseur.

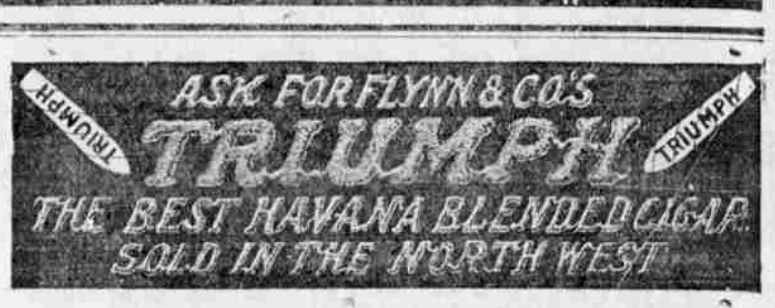
