

POWELL GIRL FOUND SUNDAY

ARMS WERE ENTWINED ABOUT A LOG.

Third Victim Is Found Near Huntington.

Huntington, Ore., Aug. 12.—Agnes Powell, another victim of the great flood of a few days ago was found last night with the arms thrown over a log. The body was held in the lake of water dammed up by the railroad track. One other child is missing and will probably be found in about the same locality within a day or two.

The body of Agnes was found under 30 feet of water where the artificial lake had backed up.

The funeral was held this afternoon from the undertaking rooms at three o'clock. Rev. J. J. Davy preached the funeral sermon and burial was in the Huntington cemetery.

FRY SHIPMENT COMES SOON

BASS FOR MORGAN LAKE WITH THE LOT.

Union County Streams to Get Trout Later in the Month.

Fry in great quantities are soon to be shipped into Eastern Oregon and the first consignment reaches here Saturday. La Grande at that time gets a shipment of bass for Morgan Lake, and Baker gets a trout shipment but a little later the trout fry for Union county streams will be brought here.

Deputy Game Warden Oral yesterday received notice from State Game Warden Finley to the effect that the fry are to be shipped here on that date, coming to La Grande in 15 10-gallon cans, addressed to J. W. Knowles and will be planted in Morgan lake. On the same train will come bass for William Hutchinson of Union and Baker gets 75 cans of trout. State Game Warden Finley will personally supervise the care of the fish en route to the destinations and attend to prompt planting of the fry once they reach here.

The fact that La Grande was to have a carnival during the present week seems not to have been very generally known, but the arrival of the carnival organization early Monday
