

MIGHTY ONES STUB TOES

BRIDGER'S PERFORMANCE WEAK-
ENS AT FINISH.

Protested Game Won in Fine Finish
by Pippins' Batting Rally.

Overcoming an enormous lead with a beautiful batting rally during a temporary slump in the fielding proclivities of the Bears at a moment when Bridger needed the best there was behind him, La Grande came up from far behind in the eighth tied with the pennant chasers, shut Brown's aggregation out in the first of the ninth and in the last of the ninth, sent a winning run over the pan. It was pretty uphill work accomplished in the face of great handicaps for La Grande had a measly three and needed five in the sixth. "Rocky" Mountain, sent to the bat on the spur of the moment when Manager King chased Mensor for insubordination, started the rally with a humming swardburner over second, taking the first ball thrown to him to do it with. Just before that Bridger had hit Lomond, and when Esola and Naughton each singled at these very opportune moments, the scoring bee was started right. McBride, of recent date developing into a cleanup swatter, produced a three bagger. The four runs tied the score and the Bears were easily blanked in the ninth. Pugsley pitching better ball as he went. Luttrell flew out as first up, King walked and Ford produced a highly appreciated two bagger. The bags filled up when Leonard dropped Lomond's easy grounder and the big show was over. It was a gallant finish for the tallenders to enact over the cheery champs.

But the victory is bedeviled with a protest. Brown filed his protest of the game in the fourth following a peculiar series of plays in the third when the official scorer gave the Bears two out of three runners sent over the pan on a base cutting proposition. The score as it stands seems to the unprejudiced observer to be correct, but it will be settled by President Sweet, and thereby local fans will have a long argument settled.

The Protested Play.

The play came in the third with two out. Bridger was on third another runner on second, Harmon on third and Davis at the bat. The latter hit out a long single, or more correctly classified, a double. The runners ahead of Harmon were of course scored on the hit, but while Harmon was on his way from third to home, Davis cut second base. (This statement contains the technical issues for the protest probably known as at what stage of the game the base was cut. It is to be assumed that Davis cut second before Harmon reached the plate, as the latter had three bases to travel, and Davis had two. The ball was retrieved from the field, held on second base and the runner declared out. The slide was retired, but Pugsley Golden refused to receive a decision on the number of bases that counted. As Davis made the third out, it stands in reason that all bases ahead of him counted and he was scored on the act that made him attempt to advance out and score after that first hit. The same would apply to any other play.

All the Pippins used newly-varnished bats yesterday and after they got to the almost invincible Bridger they saung them with lust.

The Bears carry but 11 men, playing pitchers in the in and outfield. Leonard, called "Tiny," but in reality the biggest man in Oregon—at least the largest Oregonian to wear a uniform—covered second base yesterday. Size of arms, legs and feet considered the big pitcher is considerably nifty on his pins.

Pugsley's "asleep at the switch" act in the fifth caused four runs. He forgot a force run issue and took his time at the plate in tossing out the runner, thereby neglecting opportunities for a double that would have rectified the slide. Just after that Davis cleared up the sacks with what should have been a two-bagger but slow fielding allowed a home run. To add to the delay the ball got lost in the weeds.

Manager King has lots of pepper and filled into the Pippins during a greater portion of the game. When he benched Mensor for wearing a heavy sweater to bat after orders to discard it, the team headed the first baseman's edicts with alacrity.

Bridger had beautiful form for five or six innings but he weakened, or to put it another way, the Pippin batters acquired more skill and know-how.

Pugsley was awfully good and awfully bad. But towards the end he showed brilliant form in the pinches. The little shrimp is making good only he lacks experience, which will come to him certainly enough. His pitching is not to be sneezed at by any means.
