

COVE CHERRIES BEST IN STATE

BRING TEN CENTS A POUND IN
PORTLAND MARKETS

Portland Commission Merchants
Praise Cove As a Cherry Country

When all other sections have long since concluded their shipments of cherries, the Cove section in Eastern Oregon is really at its height.

While at the present time the demand for cherries is not brisk owing to the press of other fruits, rather fair prices are again in effect owing to the excellence of the quality of the arrivals from Eastern Oregon.

The cherries are now coming from the Cove section and are of the Lambert variety and the fruit is even better quality than any shipments received this year from the Willamette valley.

"The Cove country is coming to the front as a cherry producer" says Mark Levy of Mark Levy & Co., commission merchants. "Just at present Lamberts are offering from there and sales are being made around 10c a pound. Shipments are being made both in 10 lb. boxes and in crates containing 24 one pound boxes."
