

# EGGS RAISE IN LOCAL MARKETS

ROASTING EARS OF FRESH CORN HOME GROWN 30c DOZEN

Cold Weather and Cold Storage Plants Raise Egg Prices to 17c per Dozen

Cold weather is the cause of a rise in eggs. Also the storage plants are using many eggs thereby keeping the demand above the supply. Hence eggs are bringing the delay in local markets. Several varieties of fruit and vegetable are liable to be affected should the weather remain cloudy for several days.

Roasting ears of fresh corn home grown, are in the markets selling at 30c a dozen.

The recent rains and winds have had a had effect upon the grain in a few places but no considerable damage has been done. The fruit sections escaped the force of the wind and are unharmed. The prospects for a record yield for all crops in this valley are still sound.
