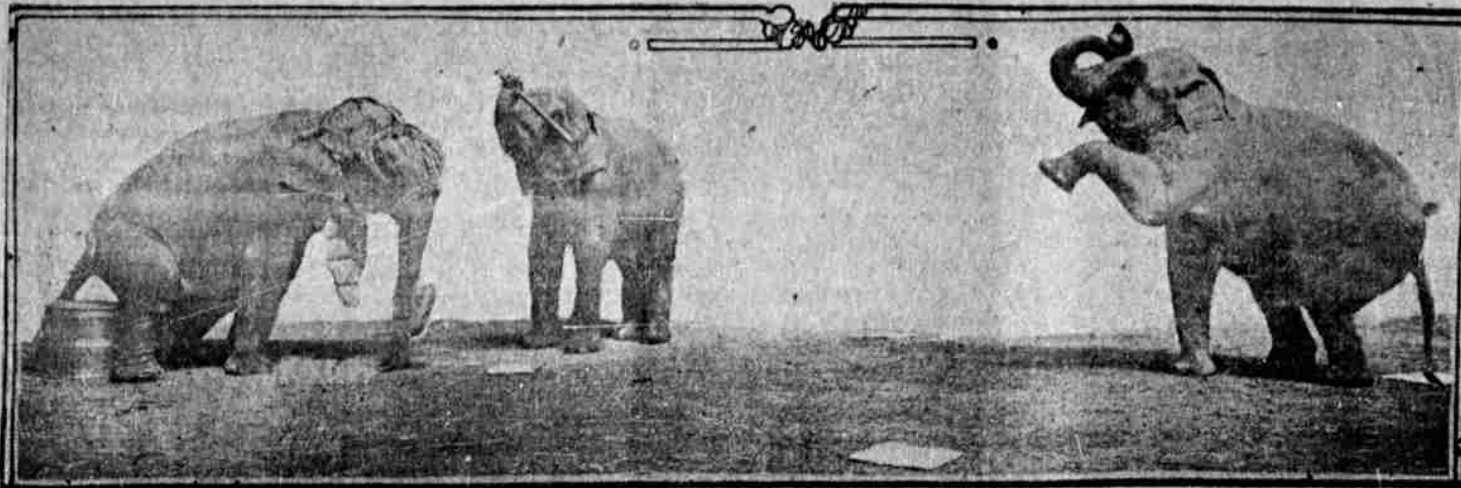


Wilson, Taft And "Teddy" Play Base Ball

PIPPINS LOSE THREE FAST GAMES TO WALLA WALLA

Three games were dropped in a row to Walla Walla Saturday and Sunday and good games they were, too. The Saturday game was especially replete with stirring moments for Walla Walla came up from behind like a black horse and sneaked victory out of apparently sure defeat. Harstead opened the matinee and for seven innings allowed a few scattering hits. La Grande meanwhile taking what looked like a safe lead. Filling the bases in the seventh Walla Walla became dangerous and King sent Pugsley to the firing line but the lad didn't have the control necessary and the Bears not only tied her up but passed the Pippins in the ninth, taking the rattling good game.

Two Extra Innings Sunday.

While Walla Walla got away with both games yesterday it required extra innings to do so. The first of the double header was about as good baseball as one wants to see and the game was of such a character that the slightest bauble meant a disadvantage. Mountain went through both games and deserved to win both. The baubles mentioned heretofore were small in size but momentous in consequence, and in the trying moments, hits were bunched. The tenth inning of a thrilling game decided the battle in favor of "Gunner" Mauser, who got away with his game not because so much of his own pitching but of the manner in which the players behind grabbed opportunities by the forelock.

The second game was a seven inning mill, but had to be stretched to the eighth to decide a score, the Walla Wallas showing a trifle better team work than La Grande in this set-to. Bridger was on the hill against Mountain and cold weather considered got off some mysteries in the pitching line. The audience was the largest in days and was well satisfied with the games though of course would have much liked to have seen the Pippins win both as they were entitled to, for they played the best fielding and inside ball a greater portion of the time. The games were the last of the season on the home grounds. The Pippins go Pendleton for a week, the three games having been transferred there, and the next week the Pippins finish the season at Walla Walla, playing probably eight or at least seven games on the gardens there. Delaware Republicans.

Dover, Del., Aug. 19:—Republican leaders of Delaware are rounding up here for their State convention tomorrow. In addition to naming three candidates for presidential electors, nominations will be made for governor and other State officers and a representative in Congress. The regular organization, led by Senators Dupont and Richardson, expects to control the convention and defeat any move made in behalf of the Progressive party. Dr. Luther S. Conwell, of Camden, is most prominently mentioned for the nomi-

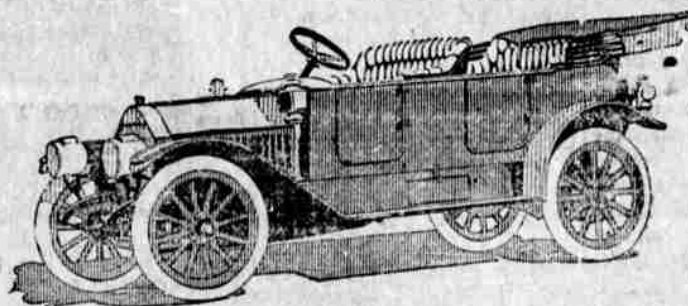
nation of governor. There appears to be considerable opposition to the re-nomination of Congressman William H. Heald, for a third term. The opposition is based primarily on the unwritten law in Delaware by both parties not to allow a representative more than two terms.

"Old Ironsides" Anniversary.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 19:—Men, women and children, including scores of summer tourists from the South and West, visited the Charlestown navy yard today to gaze reverently at the old frigate Constitution on the occasion of the one hundredth anniversary of her famous victory over the Guerriere. The famous ship, long known to history as "Old Ironsides," was decorated from stern to stern in honor of the anniversary.

The battle between the Constitution and the Guerriere was one of the most notable actions in the naval history of the United States. The Constitution, in command of Captain Hull, had left Boston late in July and after cruising about several weeks fell in with the Guerriere on August 19, 1812. The action commenced late in the afternoon. After several hours of terrific fighting, with the vessels linked so closely that the battle developed into a hand to hand conflict Captain Dacres of the Guerriere struck his colors. The surrender of the British did not occur, however, until after their vessel had been literally shot to pieces and her decks covered with the dead and dying.

Great was the excitement in Boston when the Constitution arrived with her prisoners a few days later. The victory had come at a time when the public mind required cheering. The British had scored a succession of land victories, along the Canadian frontier, and for weeks the papers had been unable to record any success for the American arms.



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
